Seek \$300 From City For Route 1

U. S. Rubber Might Locate Plant Here, Kiwanis Is Told

Henderson's part in the organization and operation of the U. S. Highway No. 1 Association, which will promote tourist travel along the North-South Highway, was explained to the Kiwanis Club last night by Boys W. Britt, executive secretary of the Henderson Chamber of Commerce.

Britt was elected second vice-president of the association, which was organized at Columbia, S. C., early this month. The association includes in its membership towns and cities along U. S. No. 1 from Richmond to Miami, Fla.

Henderson's membership fee in the Association was set at \$300 per year, based on population figure, Britt said, and corresponds favorably with other smaller cities along the route. However, Britt said the membership fee would be lowered from year to year as other cities further north on U. S. No. 1 took part in the organization's program.

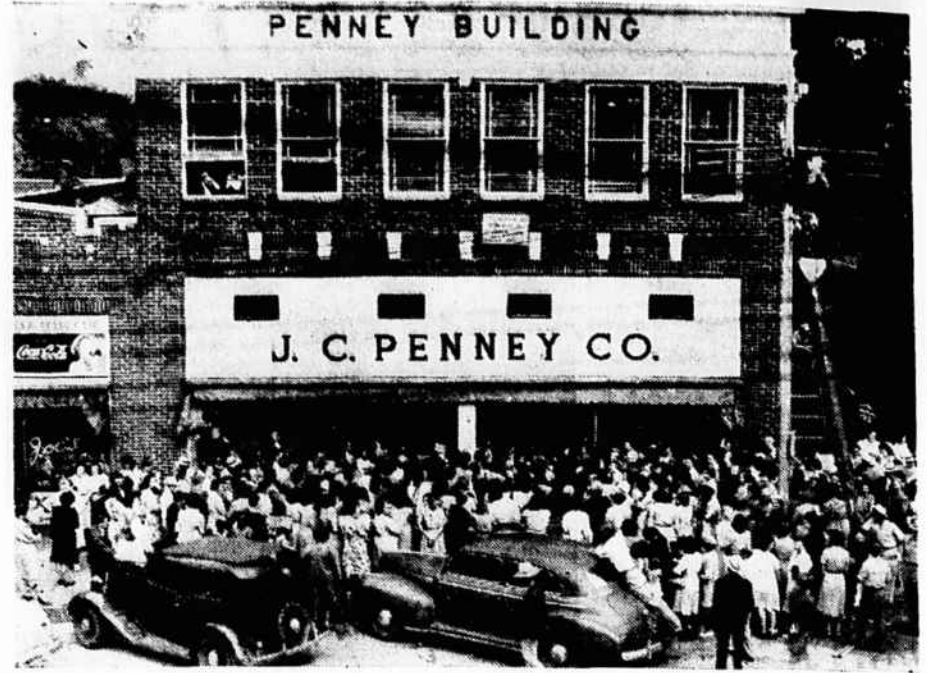
It was suggested that some local civic club or organization might want to assume responsibility for raising Henderson's membership fee as a club project, and this idea was explained to the Kiwanians at last night's meeting.

Britt also told the club of the chamber's efforts toward industrial expansion in Henderson, and said that the chamber had been made the sole bargaining agent for a complete industrial plant layout here. He did not divulge location of the new development, but revealed that representatives of the United States Rubber Company had been in the city during last week looking over the property and had been given a 15-day refusal period. The property will be held for the company for that period of time, thus giving U. S. Rubber Company time in which to decide whether it will occupy the property.

It was understood that the rubber company would manufacture latex products in operations here. The plant would employ a minimum of 200 persons and a maximum of 500 in the present building offered the company.

Britt also revealed that in the Chamber of Commerce's search for available industrial property, at least one other building which would be suitable for industrialization had been offered by its owner, while several plots of land suitably located have been filed with the chamber for possible future disposal.

ED STELL, HILLSBORO RESIDENT, DIES HERE

Body Found In Bed In Clyde Crabtree Home, Where He Was Visiting In City.

Ed Stell, 65-year-old resident of Hillsboro, was found dead in bed at the home of Clyde Crabtree at 211 Lowry street, North Henderson, yesterday afternoon about three o'clock, according to a report from Coroner A. P. Paschall.

Stell had been on a visit here for two days and members of the family left him apparently asleep and went to work early Friday morning. Returning about three o'clock, they found him dead and Coroner Paschall declared that he had been dead for several hours.

The family stated that he had been ill and had been a patient at Duke hospital, Durham, some time previously. His wife is Mrs. Alice Strange Stell, formerly of Henderson.

Cause of death had not been determined pending further investigation by the coroner.

'Old Army Game' Eliminated At Property Sales

Charlotte, Sept. 21.—Standing in line for first place in an old army custom that the Charlotte Region War Assets Administration will abolish at its next on-site of government surplus property which opens in Charlotte, N. C. on September 23, according to announcement today by the Charlotte Regional Office.

At previous on-site sales in North and South Carolina, former GIs have set up camp and waited days in order to be the first in line when the sale opened. Under a new system devised by J. K. Wilson, director of the Charlotte Regional Office of the WAA, certified veterans of World War II will, in the future, draw lots just prior to the opening of the sale for their places in line, irrespective of their time of arrival at the site. WAA will provide arrangements for the number drawing, but the actual drawing will be conducted by the veterans themselves.

This new sale, which will offer almost half a million dollars worth of textile products, paper products, hardware and miscellaneous items, will be held at the WAA Disposal Center, Drug street and Berryhill road, Charlotte, N. C. It will begin at 9 a. m. September 23, and will continue until 4 p. m. Mondays through Fridays for an indefinite period.
