About an Act Passed by the Late

the Legislature has been discovered in the secretary of state's office, without doubt a "sneaked-in-bill," which is far-reaching and damaging since no debts can be preferred, by mortgage or otherwise. It also prevents the borrowing of money on mortgage, on real estate or chattels, or on crops by a person who is in debt to parties other than the lender. It reads as follows: An act to regulate assignments:

The general assembly of North Carolina do enact: Section 1. That all conditional sales, which are executed to secure any debt, obligation, note or bond which give preference to any creditor of the maker, shall be absolutely void—as to existing creditors. Sec. 2. That all laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed. Sec. 3. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification. Ratified 3rd day of March, 1895.

Senator Blackburn to Oppose Him-An interesting and Exciting Contest to be Waged-Everything in Prog-

INTO THE ARENA

FRANKFORT, Ky., March 30 .- The Kentucky democrats are not waiting to see what course the president may pursue with regard to another international monetary conference before taking sides on the present aspect of dividing on the line of free coinage and preparing for a most energetic state campaign. Their convention for nominating a full state ticket will be held at Louisville in June, and although there are local issues of enough importance to occupy them, and although the republicans will endeavor to hold them down to the local issues, the one overshadowing national issue is certain to receive a very great deal of attention at their hands, both before and the reason why they took their own after the convention. Not improbably, lives. indeed, the complexion of the ticket itself may depend upon the expression

adopted. Unusual interest attaches to this contest by reason of the probable participation in it of Secretary Carlisle. The matter has been made the subject of a good deal of discussion in the Kentucky newspapers, and now, as the time draws near for a decision to be reached, Mr. Carlisle is being pressed to accept an invitation for an early appearance in the arena. Remarkable Increase in Manufacturing Enterprises Over a Year Ago. BALTIMORE, March 29 .- The new manufacturing and mining enterprises in the southern states for the first quarter of 1895, as reported to the Manufacturers' Record, shows an aggregate of 891; a gain of 229 as compared with the first three months of 1694. The largest increase is shown in cotton mills, of which forty-two were organized during the last three months, against nine for the same period of 1894; of miscellaneous enterprises there were 455 against 293; mining and quarrying companies increased from fifty to sixty-two; flour mills from twenty-four to thirty-seven, and cotton compresses from one to seven. In addition to these enterprises the Manufacturers' Record is advised of railway projects embracing the construction of about three hundred miles of new line in Florida alone.
