THE VANCE GUARDS VOLUNTEER.

Ready to Answer the Summons of Their Country and go Where Duty Calls.

The Vance Guards, Co. C, Third Regiment, Capt. P. T. Jones, have responded to the call for troops and signified their readiness to go where duty leads and their country directs.

All honor to Capt. Jones and his brave men. No one not in their participation can fully realize the step they take. But they do not stop to debate the question, to weigh the consequences, to count the cost. That is not the business of a soldier. And, dismissed at a soldier's duty they are ready to obey the summons "to arms" and do a soldier's duty.

Up to the present Capt. Jones has received no orders to report for duty. Adjutant General Cowles wired him Monday to know if his company would volunteer. The answer was prompt and emphatic. It was the reply that all who know the Vance Guards expected—they would.

At a meeting held later every member to a man volunteered to go anywhere on earth Company C, under its present organization, goes. Eight men were enlisted at the same time.

All honor to the brave boys! They show themselves worthy of our highest admiration and applause—worthy to wear the chaplets of heroes and patriots.

Capt. Jones was instructed to recruit his company to 84 men and a bulletin to that effect was at once posted. Several applications for enlistment have already been sent in and it is expected that the full number desired—25—will be readily secured.

The State Guard will be mobilized at Raleigh. Just when the troops will be ordered to assemble there is not yet known. It was thought they would be called out this week.

In the mean time the question of who will command the brigade is being agitated and considered by the press. There is a strong sentiment in favor of a North Carolina Brigadier for North Carolina soldiers, as well as the retention of the present field officers. And unless there is assurance that the State Guard as now composed will not undergo a complete reorganization there may not be a disposition to furnish North Carolina's quota of troops from this source.
