### AGAIN THE JORDAN MATTER.

In the Greensboro corresponce of the Charlotte Observer, of April 3rd, we find the following paragraph:

The Henderson GOLD LEAF of last week attacks J. F. Jordan for a speech he made before the tobacco growers of Forsyth county in Winston, saying he charged the press of the State with having been bribed by the Dukes, of the American Tobacco Company. When seen to-day Mr. Jordan disclaimed any intention or desire on his part to reflect on the press and said his language had been misunderstood by the Henderson editor, intentionally or otherwise. Similar statements previously made at other publie meetings have not been regarded by the press as offensive. Mr. Jordan acknowledges many courtesies received at the hands of newspaper men in the fight against the tobacco trust.

The GOLD LEAF never "attacks" any one. That is not its style or disposition. It would rather say nice things than harsh ones. It some times "goes for" a man, as in the case of Mr. Jordan, but never without sufficient provocation.

We may have misunderstood Mr. Jordan's language, but certainly we did not do so intentionally. 
