The GOLD LEHF was offered the same business(?) occupying space of one-half page, 207 square inches, at \$16,00 for eight weeks-\$2,00 a week. We declined of course and after being informed that we did not know a good thing when saw it, or words to that effect, the suggestion was made that possibly we had not given the subject the thorough and careful consideration it deserved; publishers generally were allowing discounts on their best yearly rates. besides allowing agent's commission.

as the American Cigar Company place all their advertising direct and are therefore entitled to the lowest possible rates in the paper, etc. To get the work commenced at once, however, "a final effort to get together" was made and the offer was increased to \$24,00-\$3,00 an issue.


