Rarely has any people enjoyed greater prosperity than we are now enjoying. "IT'S ME," "IT IS I."

"It is I" is the expression now generally accepted as the correct one. Five hundred years ago the English said "I am it," as the Germans express the same thought by "Ich bines." Thus the passage in Matthew xiv., 27, which in the King James verson reads: "It is I, be not afraid," is rendered in the Wyclif version, "I am it, fear not." Today's colloquial phrase "It is me," while not consistent with grammatical usage, is a sort of unconscious preference for an older, homelier idiom, against one due to foreign influences and "made in Germany." In the French parallel. "C'est moi," the moi ("me," or rather "to me") is not the subjective, but a dative, or objective with to. More objectionable than "It is me" are the phrases "It is her" and "it is him," which should be "It is she," "It is he.


