Reports have been collected from nearly all the Southern States, showing that there is grave danger of serious loss being sustained by the cotton planters and other farmers of the South by reason of their inability to secure the labor necessary to properly till and harvest their promising crops. Georgia farmers report that their output of cotton-will be smaller than usual this year, solely for the reason that they have been unable to secure sufficient help to cultivate larger areas. While the negro has been an important factor in the handling of the cotton crop, considerable dependence has been placed, in the last few years, upon the white labor. Now it is complained that the white la borers have abandoned work in the cotton fields for the purpose of securing the more steady and lucrative employment in the mills and facto ries that have been springing up in the revival of industrial enterprises in the Southern cities. It is estimated that fully 100,000 laborers. white and colored, have left the farms and plantations in North Car olina in the last year to find employ
