RAN AND WAS SHOT.

Police Officer Stops Fleeing Man With Pistol Bullet—Robert L. Hays, Wanted in West Virginia for Alleged Criminal Assault.

Tuesday morning Police Officer N. M. Henderson shot and seriously wounded Robert L. Hays, whom he was trying to arrest. Hays is wanted in West Virginia charged with criminally assaulting a ten-year-old girl. The officer had a warrant for Hays and coming up with him on one of the back streets he undertook to arrest him. When told the charge upon which he was wanted the prisoner broke and ran. The officer followed in close pursuit, calling to the fugitive to stop. When they turned the corner going in the direction of the Reavis' stables two shots were fired as a warning. This not having the desired effect the third shot sent a ball through his back, penetrating the left lung. The wound is a serious one but not necessarily fatal unless blood poison sets in and he is getting along very well.

Hays has a bad reputation. He has been in a number of difficulties and some serious charges are made against him—forgery, embezzlement, seduction and another case of assault it is said. He killed a man in this county several years ago for which he was tried for his life. He ran away at the time but came back two or three years later, gave himself up and stood trial. He was acquitted on the plea of self-defense. As soon as he is able to be taken back to West Virginia an officer will come for him.
