Hon. Edward W. Pou.

Ancient criticism of Hon. Edward W. Pou for voting to continue the Southern East mail appropriation, our Raleigh correspondent, "Hew-NAM," says this:

Since an element of the party disapproved of the vote of Congressman Edward W. Pou on the post-office appropriation bill appropriating a sum for the continued maintenance of the last mail through North Carolina from Washington to New Orleans, it is reported that they are endeavoring to induce a candidate to come out for the congressional nomination this summer in opposition to Mr. Pou in this district. But the man who enters the list against him is going to have uphill work. It is generally made the most efficient and creditable representative this district has had in Washington in many years and he has good reason to believe his good record will more than counterbalance any national and local opposition to be in a position to do more for his district and State and constituents. Mr. C. C. Daniels, who is a candidate for re-nomination to the office of Solicitor of this district at the hands of the Democratic party, in reply to a letter from Mr. Paul Jones, of Tarboro, who is also a candidate, wrote Mr. Jones as follows:

Wilson, N. C., April 23, 1906. Dear Sir: Your letter of the 18th inst. received and contents noted. You say therein that it seems to you it would be the proper thing for us to let each other alone so far as our individual counties are concerned.

I received a letter from R. A. F. Coyle, Esq., of Nashville, some time since making practically the same proposition with relation to Nash county. While at Lenoir last week W. M. Person, Esq., made a suggestion for me which I understood to mean the same thing with relation to Franklin county.

I am, as you know, a candidate for re-nomination at the hands of the Democratic party to the office of Solicitor of this district. It is not my purpose to antagonize anybody. I am simply a candidate asking the people to elect me. I understand it is a thing of the past, the people do not appear to me that either of us could find the people of any county by any agreement we might make and I am sure it is not my desire to do so. It is the province of the people of the district to consider the character, capacity and fitness of each candidate for this responsible office and to elect the one whom their judgment approves.

The day of combinations and agreements by those who assume the right to speak for the people is a thing of the past. The people are "in the saddle" and they will say what they want to fill their offices; they will pick their own servants for that is what a public officer is without asking the consent of any one who essays to speak for them.

NO POLITICS IN IT.

Appointment of Former Governor Aycock as Member of the Commission to Pan-American Congress, Was Personal and Voluntary Act of President Roosevelt Entirely.

In his letter this week our Raleigh correspondent, "Hew-NAM," says: Some of the politicians here are interpreting the declaration by former Governor Charles B. Aycock of the appointment tendered him by the President during the past week to mean that the ex-Governor has finally decided to become a candidate for the United States Senatorship, to succeed Senator Simmons. The position tendered by the President was a non-political and a very honorable and desirable one, with a salary of ten thousand dollars attached for only a few months of work—a place on the commission from this country to the Pan-American Congress, which is to meet in Rio Janeiro in July.

According to some of these politicians, one reason which actuated Governor Aycock to decline was the fact that an acceptance would take him out of the United States during the most important time to a candidate for the senatorship this year—while the selection of nominees for the legislature was being made this summer—which might and would operate against his chances of success. Others have seen fit to unjustly criticize Senator Simmons in connection with this matter. The report has been circulated and printed in a number of newspapers that Senator Simmons had secured or was instrumental in securing this appointment of Governor Aycock, and for the selfish purpose of eliminating the latter as a competitor for the senatorship to be filled next winter by the General Assembly. And, some of the critics add, this fact came to the knowledge of Governor Aycock, which accounted for such a very prompt and decided refusal of the place.

I am informed on good authority that at this time of the year, the criticism probably grew mistakenly out of the fact that Senator Simmons telegraphed the fact that the President had selected him to Gov. Aycock's soon as he learned of it, and that he would accept of the course under such circumstances it was entirely proper for Gov. Aycock to send his resignation to Senator Simmons, as a reply; for the formal official tender had not reached the office. He further explained that Senator Simmons did not want the appointment and that he did not know that it was to be made until informed by a newspaper correspondent who got his information from a Senator from another State, the latter having told it to him. It is the office of Secretary of State that probably in explaining why it would be useless for that Senator to further urge the appointment of some candidate whose claims he was preparing to support. It is represented on reliable authority that President Roosevelt personally selected Gov. Aycock, after it was decided to add two members to the commission from the Southern States. Messrs. Roosevelt and Aycock are personally acquainted with each other, and the former has heard the latter deliver at least one great speech. It is no wonder that the President at once turned to Governor Aycock, then, when he was looking for two of the best and ablest men in the South.

As to the refusal of the place, Governor Aycock has a right to expect the people of North Carolina to believe his own explanation of that, stated in his message of declaration. And this was not that given by two or three editorial fire-eaters who have explained that the ex-Governor could not afford to accept office at the hands of a Republican president. The "offer" is not an offer of the political party, but of the world to do with such an appointment, and certainly not to figure in the course with so sensible and broad-minded a man as Governor Aycock.

RURAL ROUTES SAFE SHOULD GIVE HELP.

Governor Glenn Issues Appeal in Behalf of the North Carolina Sufferers—Calls on the People of North Carolina to Extend Help to Their Brethren in Stricken City.

Washington, D. C., April 18th.—Representative Pou journeyed today from Fourth Assistant Postmaster General DeGraw that so far as he knows the Postoffice Department does not contemplate the discontinuance of any rural free delivery route in North Carolina. "Of course," said he, "it may become necessary to discontinue certain routes in the future if it shall appear that they are not appreciated by the people. The department has made no order or ruling that routes which handle less than two thousand pieces of mail per month shall be discontinued. That is a mistake. There has been no change whatever in the policy of the department respecting Rural Free Delivery service. The department wishes to give the service to the people—'not deprive them of it.'"

"Since July 1st," said Mr. Pou, "twenty-seven routes only in the United States have been discontinued and ten of these were in Kansas and West Virginia. The department has never before discontinued routes and nobody was deprived of its benefit. It seems that the Rural Free Delivery service was installed by agents in certain States who were not experts. In other words Mr. DeGraw says it was 'dummys' upon the people. Since the agents of the Postoffice Department have been studying the operation of the service they find many changes necessary for its proper administration."

General DeGraw told Mr. Pou that no route would be cut off without giving its patrons ample notice and without giving opportunity to show a proper appreciation of its benefits. Mr. Pou called at the department to find out definitely whether or not there was any danger of the discontinuance of Route No. 1 from Bear Creek in Chatham county. He was gratified to learn that the department has no intention of discontinuing that route, and of changing the daily service to tri-weekly service. Some of the patrons of this route became alarmed because of certain rumors and wrote Mr. Pou asking him to look into the matter. Mr. DeGraw told Mr. Pou that the coming of the mail of mail did not mean that any change was contemplated but the pieces of mail were counted one month in every year so that the Postoffice Department might know the condition of the service and for the purpose of obtaining necessary statistics.

On January 2nd, 1906, 1,090 routes were in operation in North Carolina with 187 petitions pending. "I feel very much encouraged," he said, "by this interview. I have been hearing of all sorts of rumors about the intention of the department to discontinue certain routes and from the letters I have been receiving I know some of my constituents are very much alarmed. I told Mr. DeGraw that I had called for the purpose of getting facts. He gave me the facts which may be summed up as follows: "First: At this time the department has no intention of discontinuing or limiting the service on any route in our State, yet the department of the service may require the discontinuance of a route here and there, but the patrons of such route will be taken care of in such readjustment."

Second: The department has made no ruling requiring that any specified number of pieces of mail must be handled to insure a continuance of daily service. Third: No route will be discontinued without notice to its patrons and without opportunity to show a proper appreciation of the service."

Leave Wilmington 4:30 a. m., connecting with the Atlantic coast line for the North and at Maxton for Red Springs and Fayetteville, at Hamlet with train No. 46 for Raleigh and points North, at Monroe with No. 53 for points between Monroe and Atlanta, arriving Charlotte 11:50 a. m., connecting with Southern Railway 12:35 p. m., for Western North Carolina points, leaving Charlotte at 4:00 p. m., arrive Lincolnton 5:32 p. m., connecting with C. & N. W. for Hickory, Lenoir, at Hickory with Southern Railway 7:00 p. m., connecting at Mount Airy with No. 22 from Atlanta, arriving Hamlet at 7:30 p. m., Maxton 8:44 p. m., connecting with A. No. 1818 will leave Charlotte now at 1:45 a. m., No. 132 at 8:15 p. m., instead of 10:15 p. m., breaking connection with No. 43 giving passengers from east and north of Hamlet direct connection for Atlanta arriving at 6:10 a. m., connecting with the West Point Route for Montgomery, Mobile, New Orleans, Texas and California points, arriving Birmingham 11:55 a. m., connecting with Frisco for Memphis and points West. The latter change will be of great benefit to Western and South-western travel giving direct connections, while heretofore it was necessary to go over at either Atlanta or Birmingham.
