Memorial Exercises.

May 10th fittingly observed in Henderson Splendid Address by Dr. Nash Graves of Confederate Dead Decorated.

Thursday, May 10th, Memorial Day, was observed in Henderson by several hundred people. Very appropriate exercises were held in Elmwood Cemetery, the address being given by Rev. J. H. Hendrill, D. D., of the M. E. Church. The procession formed at 10:30 A. M. at the M. E. Church, and proceeded, some on foot, some in carriages, to the cemetery. It was headed as usual by the members of Henry A. Wyatt Camp of Confederate Veterans, and with its long line of carriages, gaily decorated with flags, streamers and a profusion of flowers, presented an imposing spectacle. At the Graded School all the children joined in, materially sweetening the parade. The crowd drew up near the gate of the Cemetery, and there the exercises were held. Mr. J. C. Kittrell acting as Master of Ceremonies announced the programme. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. H. Hendrill, Chaplain of Wyatt Camp, and all the assemblage joined in the hearty singing of "O Carolina." Mr. Kittrell then introduced the orator of the day, Dr. Nash, who delivered an uncommonly graceful and interesting address. The speaker made the burden of his discourse the righteousness of the Confederate cause, and spoke of the necessity of educating the children of the South upon these great questions of States' Rights and Constitutional principles involved in the awful struggle of the sixties. He paid eloquent and beautiful tributes to the leaders of the Confederacy and the Confederate soldier. He also spoke with discriminating appreciation of the old Southern negro, and his noble bearing during the days of the conflict, of his treatment at the hands of the true Southern gentleman, and the remarkable progress made by the race in all directions during the days of slavery, a progress, he suggested, in the history of the world. Dr. Nash discussed the questions at issue in this great struggle between the States in a most luminous and masterly way, and for half an hour held the closest attention of the large assemblage. As an old Confederate, he was thoroughly at home with his subject, and he had his audience with him.

After the address Mrs. S. K. Rowland very effectively sang "All Quiet Along the Potomac Tonight," and there were few dry eyes among the gray and grizzled veterans, as the tragedy and tender pathos of those times that tried men's souls were recalled by the singer.

The entire assembly then joined in an enthusiastic rendering of "The Bonnie Blue Flag," and the Benediction was pronounced by Rev. W. F. Kennett. The graves of those soldiers who sleep in Elmwood Cemetery were decorated by loyal and tender hands, after which the people dispersed, glad to have had this opportunity of honoring the cause which the South will ever count it her pride to honor.

The grave of a Federal soldier buried in the cemetery was decorated along with the graves of the Confederate dead, no distinction being made in the honor paid to his memory, so far as the profession and beauty of flowers was concerned.

And this was a tribute paid, not to the man and his race, because this man—a citizen of the State of New York—died a stranger among us, but to the soldier who fought for his country and did his duty as he saw it in that cause and on that side upon his fortunes were cast.

At the conclusion of the exercises, the members of the Henry A. Wyatt Camp were served with delicious refreshments in the basement of the M. E. Church by the Daughters of the Confederacy, the organization which always does so much to make these occasions the great success they are.

Many of the stores were decorated for the occasion, a profusion of miniature flags and red, white and blue cloth, ribbons and flowers being displayed in the show windows.
