May 10th Fittingly Observed in Henderson Splendid Address by Dr. Nash Graves of Confederate Dead Decorated.

Thursday, May 10th, Memorial Day, was observed in Henderson by several hundred people. Very apwood Cemetery, the address being Veterans, and with its long line of carriages, gaily decorated with flags, streamers and a profusion of flowers presented an imposing spectacle. 


