CHARLES D. McIVER.

The death of Dr. Charles D. McIver is a distinct loss to the State and to the cause of education. It is, indeed, a public calamity.

Mr. McIver died suddenly on the special Bryan train soon after leaving Durham Monday. At Durham he complained of not feeling well and did not go to the opera house to hear Mr. Bryan speak.

At Burlington a crowd was at the station to greet Mr. Bryan who was expected to make a short speech. This is what he said:

I am sure that you will agree with me that this is not the time or occasion for a political speech when I tell you that just after we left Durham one of our party, Dr. Charles D. McIver, suddenly died.

His life perhaps more than that of any man I knew as well, illustrated the value of an ideal. He was an educated man whose sympathies were with the uneducated.

The news of Dr. McIver's death had reached Greensboro ahead of the arrival of the train. Instead of the demonstration of enthusiasm and acclaim at greeting Mr. Bryan there was the hush of silence and the atmosphere of sorrow and sadness.

Certain papers and people of the country have had more or less to say about legislation in the South requiring the separation of the races on railroads and street cars.

While there are some serious difficulties to be encountered in trying to draw class, as well as race lines on the cars and coaches of railroads, the railroad companies of the country are confronted by some problems that seem to demand a discrimination.

According to an order issued by the "Big Four" company in Illinois, white and colored laborers, when traveling in groups of fifteen or more, are no longer to be permitted to ride in other than smoking cars.
