The proposed increase of the capital stock of the Norfolk and Southern railroad means more money for railway development in eastern North Carolina. That will mean increased valuation of farming and trucking lands, the opening up of territory now kept back because of lack of facilities for reaching the markets, the growth of the towns, the establishment of new industrial plants and the general development of that whole section of the state. The area embraced in that railway system is very large, extending as far south as New Bern and as far west as Raleigh. The development of the Norfolk and Southern railway system will be of wonderful advantage to that part of the state.
