The Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, "antedating by over welve months the National Declaration at Philadelphia," naturally receized due honor. There is less sectionalism now, he declared, than existed "even in the decade before the civil war.' and there will soon be none at all. He verged toward politics only twice: when he declared with manifest sincerity his previously stated belief that for the public good each State should have a strong opposition party, and when he declared with sincerity no less manifest that no political motives whatever entered into the recent judgeship appointment. Mr. Taft, bandsomely introduced by Governor Kitchin, had his hearers according him spontaneous applause from first to last. The audience believed in the man and the man believed in the audience. ### Rogers' Virginian Road.

Norfolk, Va., May 19.-A railroad system, 446 miles long, stretching from Sewall's point, Norfolk, to Deepwater, W. Va., personally built at a cost of \$40,000,000, and opening up 1.000,000 acres of coal domain in the Kanawha coal field territory, tells the story of triumph in this State of the greatest ambition of Henry H. Rogers, whose sudden death from apoplexy occurred at his home in New York at an early hour this morning.

It was a little over seven weeks ago that Mr. Rogers, the guest of honor at a twenty-dollar-a-platedinner, amid a notable assemblage, with his spirits attesting his gratification at living to see the dream of his life, the Virginian Railroad, realized, celebrated in Norfolk the opening of that system. Mr. Rogers had spent a good deal of his time here going over the work of planning, construct ing, completing, and inspecting the road which he built and owned.

The Virginian Railway was begun in March, 1892; completed February other officials of a number of railway systems, Mark Twain and othters. joined with him on this occasion. On the occasion of his visit to Norfolk at that time, Mr. Rogers inspected the new steel pier of the railroad, attended a public reception in his honor, and then made a tour of

He is variously reported as mencing life as a newsboy driver of a grocery cart. Mr. Rogers was a man of many friends and enthusiastic yachtsman. Until revent ly he held the reins of the Standar Oil Company following the rement of John D. Bockefeller. though J. D. Archbold attended the routine management of the gre-

His fortune is variously estimate from \$50,000,000 to \$75,000.0 which will make his son, H Rogers, Jr., one of the richest med

The death of Mr. Rogers follows closely upon the completion of the great railway project to the an complishment of which the energies of his later years, his genius for organization, and a considerable portion of his private fortune were devoted. This was the building of the Virginian Railway, a line which opened up a rich bituminous com country in West Virginia extending 443 miles from Deepwater, W V to a tide-water terminal at S walls Point, Va. This road was distinctly an individual uundertaking of M Rogers and he personally bore the greater part of the cost of its construction, which has been estimated at \$40,000,000. Mr. Rogers had embarked on his venture some time prior to the fiancial panic of 1907, and the work of building this line went on to its finish mainly because of the energy and faith which he applied to the achievement of his purpose.
