Hickory Depot Case Reopened

City Attorney Huffam to-day received a notice that the State Supreme Court has granted the rail-road a rehearing in the Hickory depot case.

This means that that the case will be considered again by the Supreme court as if it had just come up on appeal from the Superior court. To get a rehearing two of the five Supreme court judges must certify that there was some important point in the first decision that may have been improperly adjudicated. The court will not hear arguments, however, but will review the matter on printed briefs submitted by each side. Generally the court when a rehearing is granted stands by its judgment but some times the decision is changed. It is certainly to be hoped that this vexatious litigation which has dragged out so long will not be renewed.
