## "I WROTE YOU" WINE OF CARDUI

At Least 15 Persons Injured in Disastrous Wreck near Greensboro

Passenger Train No. 30 Wrecked Late this Afternoon at Jamestown, N. C. Injured Taken to Greensboro.

Partial List of The Injured. Three Cars Torn to Splinters. Cause of Wreck. A Full Story of Disaster.

Greensboro, N. C., July 15.—This afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at Jamestown, between Greensboro and High Point, a most disastrous wreck occurred, when three cars of passenger train No. 30 were derailed and torn into splinters, as train was approaching Jamestown.

Estimated that at least 15 persons were injured, though it is not thought here at 3:30 this afternoon that any of the injured will die.

A train arrived here at 3 o'clock carrying a few of the injured, who are now in the hands of a physician. A doctor was sent to relieve the suffering at the scene of the wreck until they can be brought here to the hospital.

Those of the injured who have just been brought here, are:

- S. W. Lann, of Jackson, Tenn., head badly cut.
- H. W. Clark, of Mobile, Ala., teeth knocked out and shoulder broken.
- Conductor of the Pullman, D. L. Baris, of Alexandria, Va., shoulder dislocated.
- T. H. Blewett, of Atlanta, Ga., arm and shoulder broken.

It is known that at least a half-dozen of others are badly hurt, but only one car load has arrived here.

Story of the Wreck. The cars wrecked were the dining car, private Pullman and a car of the Mobile Air Line, which was being carried on the passenger train and on which all of those who were injured were riding.

It is thought that the wreck was caused by the spreading of a rail. All three of the cars that were derailed were piled in one great heap of debris being torn into splinters.

The reports from the wreck are rather vague and it may be even worse than it is reported here.

New Companies Chartered. Raleigh, N. C., July 15.—The Moore Cotton Mill Company, of Lenoir received a charter at a capital of \$150,000 authorized, \$80,000 subscribed, H. B. Moore and others.

Another charter is to the Merchants Grain and Provision Company, of Monroe at a \$75,000 capital by the Henderson Snyder Company and other mercantile corporations of this section.

Autobus Off for New York. Chicago, Ill., July 15.—The automobiles in the Golden tour left here for a run to New York. To avoid accidents there has been so frequent on the run this far it was decided that the official car shall act as pace maker and none of the others be allowed to pass it.

BOMB ARTIST BUSY

Explosion Occurred in Front of American Embassy—Four Girls Injured. Constantinople, July 15.—A bomb was exploded last night in front of the summer quarters of the American Embassy at Yen-Kenli. Four girls were slightly injured. Otherwise no damage was done. The authors of the outrage were not traced.

For Negroes and Indians. Rome, July 15.—The form of organization and statutes for the sisterhood of Negroes and Indians, organized by Mrs. Brown, have been approved and authorized by the Pope.

# Famous Trial Is Now On

Monroe, N. C., July 15.—A large crowd gathered here today to attend the famous trial of the twenty alleged lynchers of John V. Johnson.

Last night's train brought many people from Anson county and the hotels here are filled with visitors.

Judge Peebles is presiding over the special term, which was ordered by Governor Glenn. Most of the forenoon was spent in preliminary work, and up to 2:30 this afternoon the trial had not fully begun.

Great interest is expressed on all hands and the court room was crowded when court was called to order this morning.

There were originally 23 men charged with the lynching of Johnson, but since the warrants were sworn out against them three have escaped and have since not been apprehended.

It is hard to say how long the trial will last.

It will be remembered that these cases came up here once before, the case of Zeke Lewis being called as a test case. The defendant then claimed that the case could not be tried in Union county since the crime, if committed, was done in Anson. However, recently the supreme court decided that the cases might be tried in Union and accordingly the governor ordered the special term which opened today.

At 4 o'clock this afternoon the jury had not been completed. It is thought the jury will be selected this evening and the trial proper will commence tomorrow.

# 18 Injured in Bad Explosion

Washington, D. C., July 15.—News reached the navy department of an explosion on the battleship Georgia by which 17 persons were injured.

The accident occurred while the ship was at target practice.

An official telegram to the department follows: "In an accident on the Georgia at 10 o'clock today 17 were injured, eight seriously. An eight-inch charge ignited. Lieut. Goodrich and Midshipmen Cruise and Goldthwaite were injured; Cruise seriously. None are dead yet. The board of investigation ordered and will send the Georgia to the Boston navy yard at once for the transfer of the injured to the hospital."

Five Dead. At 4:20 this afternoon five are reported dead on account of the explosion on the battleship Georgia.

# Ship Ashore All are Safe

New York, July 15.—The Long Island Sound steamer Shinnock, from Greenport, Long Island, for this city with passengers, ran ashore on Hart Island during a dense fog. The Shinnock is high and dry on the shore.

Tugs have gone to the assistance. The passengers are not considered in danger.

When the crash came 200 passengers hurried from the staterooms to the deck, but were assured by the officers that there was no danger.

Later they were taken off in launches to a city on the island where they await a steamer to take them to the city.

Floated at High Tide. The Shinnock was floated at high tide.

SILVER STOLEN AS LEAD. Value of 36 Bars Not Discovered Till Plumber Tried to Melt Them.

Omaha, Neb., July 14.—After stealing 36 bars of silver bullion from a freight car, the thief disposed of a portion to a plumber under the belief that it was lead.

The plumber bought it for lead, and it was not until he sought to use it in his trade and discovered it would not melt at the accustomed temperature that he first suspected that something was wrong. This morning Geo. Hoover was arrested, charged with the robbery. It was later discovered another plumber had bought several bars of bullion, also believing it to be lead.

About half the plunder has now been recovered. Its value is estimated at approximately \$2,000.

# State Board Examiners In Session To-day

Raleigh, N. C., July 15.—The state board of examiners were in session today to pass on the examination papers of a great number of teachers from all parts of the state, who stood examinations before county superintendents for five year licenses as public school teachers and for licenses as public high school teachers.

It will be several days before the result is announced.

# Many Natives Starved as Result of Volcanic Outburst

San Francisco, July 15.—An outburst of the volcano on the Peninsula of Kamtchatka February 18 last threw the whole country into utter darkness for more than 48 hours and resulting in the starving of scores of natives, according to officers of the barkentine Castle which reached port from Okhotsk Sea.

# Greeks Appeal For Protection

New York, July 15.—I. C. Maximes, acting consul general of Greece at New York will make representation to the secretary of state protesting against the action of the mob at Roanoke, Va., Saturday night, when several Greek restaurants and places of business were wrecked during the progress of riots and asking that the Greeks be given the fullest possible protection of the law.

A telegram was received at the Consulate here from Roanoke, signed by 150 Greeks, appealing for protection against the mob.

The Greeks telegraphed that the Roanoke police were unable to cope with the situation and afford them protection from the rioters.

Acting Consul General Maximes said: "I shall inform Secretary Root at once, that something may be done to secure protection for my countrymen. I presume Secretary Root will communicate with the Governor of Virginia and ask that he take steps to prevent trouble. While I have only slight information concerning the situation at Roanoke I do not think that the disorders developed from any racial differences but rather from an insignificant cause which probably was seized upon as a pretext to make a fight, which developed into a riot."

All is Now Quiet. Richmond, Va., July 15.—Governor Swanson communicated by long distance telephone with Mayor Cutchin, of Roanoke, to inquire as to the state of affairs after Saturday night's rioting.

Mayor Cutchin reported that all was quiet.

The governor instructed the mayor that should the rioting begin again and there was any need of state aid to telegraph at once. He said peace must be kept and the state would be prepared to enforce it.

# Fight Against Southern Rwy.

It is Understood Governor Glenn Has Retained Able Counsel in Suits Against Southern State vs. Federal Court.

Raleigh, N. C., July 15.—It is understood that Governor Glenn has retained ex-Governor Charles B. Aycock, E. J. Justice, speaker of the 1907 house of representatives and S. G. Ryan, of Raleigh, to aid in the prosecution of the cases against the Southern Railway Company, indictments of Ticket Agent Green here for selling tickets at more than the 2 1/2 cent rate, also that the governor has addressed letters to all judges of the superior courts in the state urging them that they have indictments issued for the agents and officials and endorsing the course of Judge Long in Wake court.

He don't want the railroads "muled" in the suits of this kind but enough of them to test the case in every phase. The counsel retained will take a hand in the impending contest between the state and federal courts.

# Incendiaries Burn Large Number of Houses

Moghilev, Russia, July 15.—Smolnan a small town in this neighborhood has suffered severely at the hands of incendiaries. One hundred and fourteen houses occupied by Jews and 15 tenanted by Christians, as well as 70 shops, have been burned.

Several persons perished in the flames.

# Operators May Strike Yet

Unless Settlement is Immediately Brought About General Strike of Commercial Telegraph Operators is Probable.

San Francisco, July 15.—Unless the settlement of the Commercial Telegraphers strike is effected tomorrow a general strike may be declared.

The request for a settlement will be in the nature of a demand, for the men feel they have the approval of President Small, as well as the individual endorsement of the membership of the Commercial Telegraphers Union throughout the country.

The statement is made that if the national executive board should attempt to force a settlement pleasing to the strikers, President Small will call out the Chicago employes as a first move in the extension of the strike zone.

Commissioner Neill made no visit yesterday, but said he thought a settlement was yet possible with concessions on both sides.

Mr. Small said the time for talking had ended and he would not discuss the situation other than to say that the hope for peace had not been abandoned.

Crisis Near at Hand. New York, July 15.—A crisis in the dispute between the telegraph companies and their employes is expected to develop today as a result of the constant telegraphic communications between the executive board of the Telegraphers Union and President Small, and Secretary Russell, in San Francisco.

A message was received from Secretary Russell, directing the local executive board to meet this afternoon and be prepared for any emergency.

# Progress Made, Haywood Trial

Boise, Idaho, July 15.—When the Haywood trial was resumed Judge Wood announced he had decided to sustain the objection of the defense to the admission in evidence of the records of the state insane asylum showing the commitment to that institution of John D. Elliott, who as a witness for the defense testified to a long conversation with Orchard.

Harry Orchard will be a witness in the rebuttal for the state.

William Dewey, who started the court room Saturday by confessing to participation in the Coeur d'Alone riots and the attack on Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mill, was recalled further to identify W. F. Davis as the man who handed out guns and ammunition the day the mob started for the mill.

The defense took advantage of Dewey's re-appearance to question him further as to his motive for testifying this time.

Dewey denied that he had been allowed to go in debt to the extent of \$300 to the union store at Cripple Creek through the leniency of Davis.

"Didn't Davis finally deny further credit to you and wasn't it then that you left the union," asked Richardson.

"No, sir."

Lanson on Stand. C. D. Lanson, of the Boise Gas Light Co., was called as an expert to rebut the theory of the defense that the Bradley explosion was caused by gas. Lanson declared in positive terms that gas would not ignite from any glow such as that in lighting a cigar.

San Francisco, July 15.—The barkentine S. N. Castle arrived here from the Cod Fishing grounds off the coast of Siberia and reported that the vessel had been boarded by the Russian Gunboat Mandjur, her ships papers taken and warned to stay 30 miles from the shore under threats of being confiscated and the officers and crew taken to Peteropavlovsk, in Irons.
