

Dean Burgess who has the distinction of being the first Roosevelt professor, went to Germany in July, 1906, to lecture on constitutional law and history of the United States in the universities of Berlin, Bonn and Leipsic. He said that he had lectured to over 1,500 German students in the three big universities. In addition he lectured before an association of officials, jurists and lawyers in Berlin and Cologne and

before two organizations in Vienna. While lecturing in Bonn, he gave instruction to Prince Augustus Wilhelm, the fourth son of the Emperor.

He said the Kaiser was deeply inter ested in the Roosevelt professorship, took it very seriously and supported it in every way possible. The high German officials, the bar and university professors and, students were also greatly interested in the course, he added. He was invited on several occasions to dine with the Emperor and was lavishly entertained by many of the high officials.

He displayed casts showing favorable effects of early treatment of the exter nal or skin cancer by radium and added comment on the sometimes effective supplementary use of the Roentgen Rays.
