The Hickory Band went down to play for the sale and did their best, in spite of the rain. Their playing was highly praised.

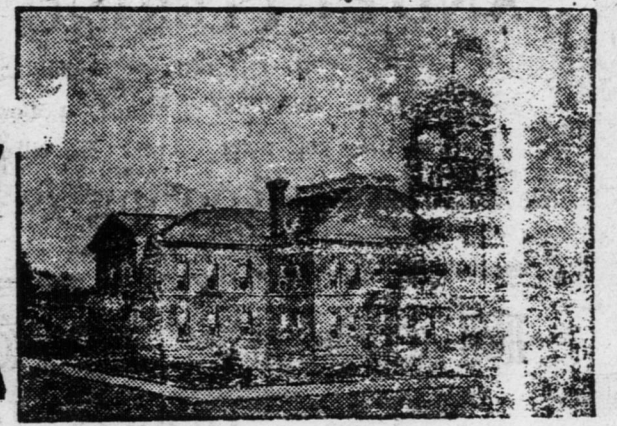
A Narrow Escape.
