He received a letter, which contained a check for the above amount. The letter was written on the firm stationery, had the firm's name stamped with rubber stamp and the check was signed in ink "B. W. Dursiug, treasurer." It is the custom of our hotel managers to sign these checks for the traveling men, and Mr. Marshall did so without the slightest uneasiness, just as Mr. Gilmer did. Then, when the checks were sent in to the firm, they were returned, with the announcement that so such man as R. W.
