1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to renew their subscription.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the postoffice to which they are addressed they are responsi-Regulets is enough. > 4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publisher and the paper is sent to the former address, they are held responsible.

6. If the subscribers pay in advance, they are bound to give notice at the end of the time, if they do not wish to continue taking it, otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it and the subscriber will be responsible until express notice, with payment of all arrearages, is sent to

the publisher. The latest postal laws are such that newspaper publishers can cause the arrest of anyone for fraud who takes a paper and refuses to pay for it. Under this the law the man who allows his subscription to run along for paper marked "refused" lays himself liable to arrest and the fine the same as for theft.-Ex.
