### NO REASONABLE COM-BINATIONS?

We hardly know what position to take in regard to the dissenting opinion of Justice Harlan in the Standard Oil case. He brands as mischievious the modification made by the court in the decree of the lower court, permitting subsidiary corporations of the Standard Oil after dissolution of the combination, to make "normal and lawful agreement" among themselves. Chief Justice White, all the justices concurring, except Judge Harlan, held that there may be a reasonable restraint of trade by combination, although that which had been effected by the Standard Oil was not of this nature. In this ruling the court reversed all previous decisions which the court had made when the Sherman Anti-Trust law was affected.
