The Henry River Injunction.

Judge Cline in chambers here Saturday granted an injunction forbidding Henry River from emptying the mill sewerage into the river without the use of the disinfecting system approved by the state Board of health; and also the raw sewerage from closets over any open drain direct to the river. He refused to restrain from the use of closets on the hill side, even when the slope is toward the river, as there is a statute which provides that such closets must use tubs or burn their sewerage. City Attorney A. A. Whitener appeared for the city and Mr. A. L. Quikel, of Lincolnton, for Henry River.

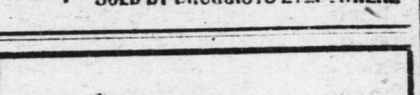
