Asheville, June 9.—In response to a question from a Citizen representative tonight Governor Craig, who arrived here this afternoon for a month's rest, declared that a special session of the legislature will be called to consider the freight question as it affects this state. That has been contemplated ever since the last session of the general assembly, and I will certainly take any proper action that may be necessary to secure for North Carolina fair treatment by the railroads. With fair treatment the cities and towns of North Carolina will grow and prosper, and we are going to have that treatment before long."


