

After endorsing the work so far done by the Southern 10)resentatives in Congress in the matter of furnishing transportation for the export trade, and providing currency to finance the crop, the congress endorsed a bill introduced in the House by Representative Wingo, of Arkansas, authorizing the issuance of Federal reserve notes on cotton.

Later the report from the resolutions committee was adopted outlining a plan to meet the entire situation. This provided for the appointment of a committee with Congress, the Treasury Deserve Board to seek means of "financing and marketing the crop, without unnecessary loss to the farmer."

1-2 cents a pound, based on middling cotton.

It urged the Federal Reserve Board and the Secretary of the Treasury to place \$300,000,000 in the banks of the South, on the basis of the cotton produced in each State. It then proposed that every farmer should have the right to go to his bank, and secure a loan on notes maturing in six months but renewable for six months, secured by his cot-ton on one-half of the crop he raised, to eighty per cent. of the
