Berlin, Aug. 27. - More than
200,000 prisoners, several thou-
sand cannon and enough rifles tc
supply several army divisions
have been captured by the Ger-
mans since the fall of Warsawf,
according to the official report
issued today.
In the three weeks following
the fall of the Polish capital the
Russians have been driven back
for more than 100 miles and the
first line of defenses captured.
All of the second line defenses
have also fallen, excepting Grod-
no. This city is expected to fall
before General von Hindenburg's

week.
