DECORATED AUTOMOBILES A FEATURE OF PARADE


Thirty Dollars in Prizes to be Awarded Owners Of Cars in City and County---Hickory Will be in Gala Dress for Occasion



Muscovites Move Swiftly From Vilna Region, But Will not Escape With Entire Army. Prince Leopold and Mackensen Are Stopped

AND CANNON IN RETREAT

(By the Associated Press) London, Sept. 22.—Special dispatch-

es to Petrograd agree that the Russians have swept on swiftly from the Vilna salient, the strategic value of which was considered so great that the Russian general staff considered it worth risking a large number of men to hold.

In their withdrawal the Russians are said to have destroyed everything of military value. Although the army is safe, it is hardly likely that the whole Russian army will escape without heavy losses in men and guns. The encircling movements of the Germans are still held up. 




