Mr. Shuford was asked several days ago why cotton was so active. He did not know why it was going up. At that time futures were selling for less than ten cents.

March and April futures opened on the New York exchange at 12.95 and 13.05, and even the near months, like October and December, stood out prominently at 12.10 and 12.50.
