PROFITING BY WAR

(Ly Associated Press.) Paris, Feb. 5.-The formidable traffic in connection with the army nas enriched cities like Havre, Rouen, Boulogne, Calais and Amiens, where the British have made heavy expenditures, and cities like Bordeaux, Lyons and Marseilles: where the needs of the French and allied armies have given rise to the most intense indus-

trial and commercial movement. Other cities and a great many small towns situated so as to contribute to the great effort have also gained immensely. In all these places the circulation of money exceeds the most extravagant anticipation and gives to the superficial observer the impression of increased wealth . More money is spent in a night in Marseilles than was ever spent in a week before the war. The same is not true of the other war-enriched cities because of the restriction of opportunities for outlay upon

amusements and distractions. make a show for itself.
