**MAKE IT UNIFORM**

Having passed the bill to give Bertie county the privilege of electing its board of education, the general assembly should not stop at that, but should accord the same right to every county in the state, whether it is Democratic or Republican. The system should be as near uniform as possible.

The Record has not been exercised over the manner of selecting county boards of education. It has believed that a minimum of politics and probably a maximum of efficiency would result from the present system, because it has realized that many improvements, such as consolidation of schools, could not be effected under the elective system because of local sentiment.

But we are not concerned seriously. We had thought the short ballot idea was making headway along with the agitation for commission government, but it seems that this is not the case in North Carolina.

The general assembly, having let down the bars again, should not adjourn until it gives every county the right of electing the members of its board of education in the manner that county desires.

Ruthlessness "to the limit" begins now, and the full destructiveness of the U-boats when used without scruple against friends and foe alike is yet to be tested. Since the great advantage claimed for this unsparing savagery is that submarines can sink more ships if they do not discriminate, it is hard to imagine on what basis the German government thought it could negotiate; not to discriminate is the very essence of the scheme. Nor is it very clear what advantage was to be gained by carrying the decree of January 31 into effect at the end of that day if ships were still to be treated with some caution and consideration for neutral lives. What could be done on those lines the U-boats were already doing, and the only obvious result from putting the decree into effect instantly was to present neutrals with an accomplished fact, and so allowing them no time to use pressure for a postponement. It is the doctrine of Machiavelli that an injury should be made sharp and severe, so that any subsequent concessions may be regarded as favors, and not a little newspaper comment in this country at the smallest hint of a concession shows that the cunning of Machiavelli has not lost force in four centuries.

**FRENCH GLASS INDUSTRY TAKING OVER GERMAN**

(By Associated Press.)

Paris, Feb. 16.—The French glass industry has succeeded in replacing glass laboratory receptacles that came from Germany before the war. It was necessary to make an exhaustive study of the new glass because the composition differs from the German product and the chemist needed exact data as to the conditions under which it would be attacked by reagents and what resulting errors of analysis were to be feared. The work has been completed by M. Paul Nicolardot who declares the French glass to be fully equal to the German.

**FARM SCHOOL POULTRY**

R. K. Kaupp, poultry investigator and pathologist, North Carolina experiment station, West Raleigh, in his monthly circular No. 26, has the following interesting summary of poultry work at Startown farm life school:

The birds on the Startown farm life school farm are the Latham strain Barring Plymouth Rocks. The flock the first year consist of 10 pullets and a cockerel. One pullet died the third month leaving 9 pullets and the cockerel to complete the year. These pullets cost \$3 each and the cockerel \$5 or \$35 for the start.

The house at the school was constructed after the plan furnished from the office of poultry investigations and pathology experiment station, West Raleigh. It is the portable farmers house described in circular No. 6 of the station extension service. The building is 10 feet by 14 feet with shed roof and open front. It is provided with sled runners so that it can be moved about, being in the corn or cotton fields and gathering brigs and worms and thus provide them with animal food and at the same time protect the crops. The house is provided with dropping board, perch poles, nests, water rack, broody coop, grain storage bin, and mash hopper—in fact all modern poultry equipment.

The hens are to be set in the company of a single and breeding coops and the flocks brooded in the same. These are described in circular No. 6.

The first year began December 1, 1915 and ended December 1, 1916. The flock was given a grain feed in litter in the house consisting of wheat, oats and corn. This was given morning and evening. One pint was given to each 12 hens. They were also given a dry mash consisting of bran. They were given oyster shell. The birds were allowed to run on range so grit was not necessary. The following quantities of feed was consumed by the hens during the year: wheat, 241 pints; corn, 211 pints; oats, 137 pints; wheat bran, 142 pints; oyster shell, 48 pounds. This cost \$11.04.

These hens laid in the year 1,001 eggs or an average of 112 per hen. The value of eggs per hen was \$4.16. The cost of feed per hen bird was \$1.10 and the profit on eggs per bird was \$3.06.

That the profit on eggs was so great is due to the fact that high grade pure bred birds were used and some eggs were sold for setting purposes. It pays to keep only pure bred birds. The product of the flock.

There were 50 chickens raised during the year. These chicks consumed the following quantities of feed: wheat bran, 69 pounds; oat meal, 5 pounds; grits, 4 pounds; screenings, 10 pounds; corn, 340 pounds; wheat 353 pounds. This feed cost \$17.62.

The total summary for the year's work is as follows: Value of eggs sold, \$6.27; value of manure, \$0.30; 41 head young stock on hand at \$1 each (a very low valuation) \$41; Total—\$85.82 or a total profit of \$56.06.—Newton Enterprise
