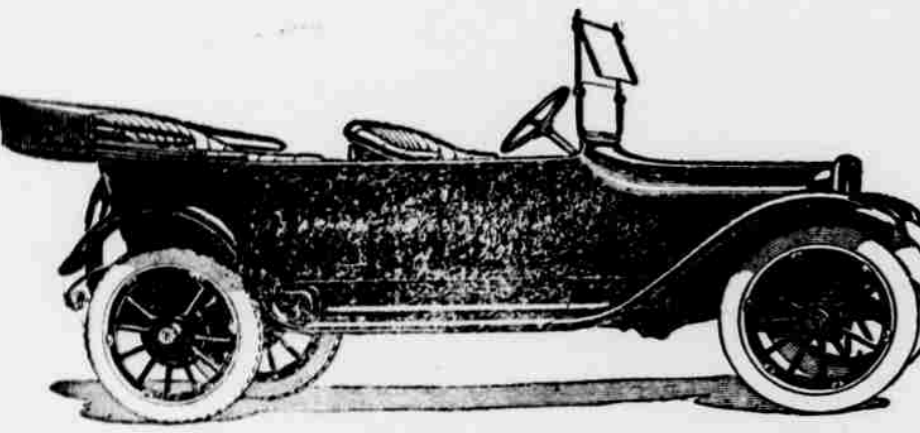

SAN FRANCISCO HONORS MEMORY OF FUNSTON

San Francisco, Feb. 24.—The body of Maj. Gen. Frederick Funston, who died in San Antonio, Texas, last Monday night, arrived here over the Southern Pacific Railroad for interment today at Presidio.
A drizzling rain fell on army officers and four companies of coast artillery who stood at attention under arms as the lower-covered casket was taken from the car into a hearse. The funeral cortege marched to the City Hall where the body is lying in state tonight. At the depot and along the line of march, crowds of civilians stood, heads bared in the rain, in memory of the gallant soldier who won the hearts of all San Franciscans, for what he did for them when they were homeless and panic-stricken in the chaotic days of the 1906 fire and earthquake.

The body was received into the great rotunda of the city hall by Major James Rolph, Jr., Maj. Gen. Franklin Bell and Rear Admiral William P. Fullam, U. S. N., and General Bell's staff officers.
Messages of condolence from all sections of the country were received by Mrs. Funston. The funeral procession will be composed of two regiments of coast artillery headed by Major General J. Franklin Bell, commanding the Western department. Interment will be made at the National Cemetery in the presidio reservation with full military rites.

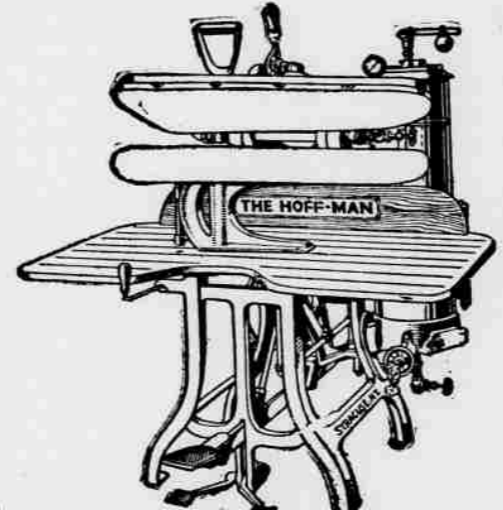
