TO MAKE SURVEY OF WINSTON-SALEM

Chapel Hill, Feb. 27.—A survey of Winston-Salem and Forsyth county, embracing economic, industrial, social and educational interests, has just been begun by the extension department of the university, and will be carried out on an extensive scale during the next few months. The specific lines of investigation are in charge of various members of the university faculty. Prof. L. A. Williams, of the school of education, and director of the correspondence work, will be in general charge of the school of survey by Prof. R. H. Latham, of the Winston-Salem school of business. Prof. E. C. Branson will be general director of the economic and social survey of the county, and Prof. C. L. Raper, head of the department of economics, will probably direct the industrial survey of the city of Winston-Salem. The studies will be published in book form about June 1 and it is the object of those behind the survey to get a copy of this report into the hands of every person in the county, as well as to make it a text-book in the schools. The Forsyth County Alumni Association of the University and the Twin-City Club are backing the survey, and providing facilities for carrying it out on a thorough scale. Prof. R. H. Latham is directing the work locally. The studies will be edited in Chapel Hill, but will be printed in the print shop of the Winston-Salem high school. Prof. L. A. Williams spent last week in Winston-Salem, beginning the school survey, and will often visit Winston-Salem while the work is getting started. Prof. E. C. Branson was also in Winston-Salem last week to begin his part of the work. Many of the Forsyth county studies have already been worked out here by members of the North Carolina Club from the Twin City. It was these studies which Dr. Branson has in his files that inspired the authorities to extend the nature of the inquiries and to make a thorough-going and complete survey from many angles. The survey, therefore, will serve a model for similar work in the future, and will especially be a guide for conditions in the Piedmont section of the state. The local university alumni have made the work possible there for the extension department to secure the most satisfactory results. Present conditions of the schools as to buildings, equipment, financial support, teaching corps, supervision and administration features, will be carefully studied and reported upon by Professor Williams, as well as hygienic conditions, distribution of space etc. in the school buildings. Arrangements are now being made at the university for a spring parent and community festival to the one held last year. This will come the first week in May. Shakespeare's Twelfth Night will be produced at night and there will be a pageant in the afternoon. A special outdoor stage will be constructed. It is planned to have all the agencies in the community participate, and there will be parts assigned to students of the graded school, townspeople, and students and faculty of the university will probably be produced.
