PRESIDENT WILSON

Woodrow Wilson Monday will begin his second term as president of the United States. He will possess the confidence of the people of the United States as he has never had it before.

Inheriting the Mexican problem, he had served less than two years and for the European war broke out and set fire to half the world. Mr. Wilson preserved the peace of this country, at the same time pushing through congress more reform legislation than had been enacted in any two decades.

The American people know Woodrow Wilson is safe. Many of them think he is too safe, that he is not assertive enough in foreign matters, and that a little more display of nerve would have accomplished more. Undoubtedly he has striven to preserve peace for the people of the United States.

In the new crisis that has faced the country in the last few days, the American people may be sure that their president will do nothing hastily and that whatever he does will be done after painful consideration. If the United States is forced into war, the people will know their president is not responsible. We are just beginning to understand some of the great problems that he has faced and we are freer to give him credit for wise leadership.

A WISE COURSE

It is interesting to note, as Colonel Bost says, that Republican members prided themselves on voting for the \$3,000,000 bond issue to provide building funds for the various institutions in the state. There was only one dissenting vote in the senate, and that was by Little, Democrat of Anson. The Republicans paraded extravagance in the campaign last fall.

The general assembly, before it adjourns about Tuesday, will let the world know that North Carolina is able and willing to provide for its institutional needs. No longer can fights be made on public education with any chance that meritorious institutions will be crippled.

The state needs all the influences possible to remove ignorance and poverty, and opportunities for advancement should be afforded the humblest parent to give his children an equal chance.

The Statesville Landmark wonders how many editors who now are advising their readers to cultivate tater patches will be found later on fishing beside the still waters, or words to that effect. We hope to do a little of that too, but if the tubers can be purchased at all, we expect to be kept busy in the garden at odd moments. The Rev. S. B. Stroup has consented to lend two hands, and a grocery store has agreed to buy all produce. Will the Landmark man come up about June 15 and note progress?

The Durham Herald urges a boulevard between Durham and Chapel Hill, saying that 90 per cent of the students of the University and visitors to Chapel Hill hit the macadam and sand-clay road in preference to the ancient passenger train at University Station. There ought to be an electric line between the two points, and with the growth of the University and the increase in traffic, such a line would pay.

The newspapers' legal advertising bill, after passing the senate by an overwhelming majority, was tabled in the house by its author after it was rendered practically worthless by amendment. It would not have made any difference to Catawba county papers anyway, because they take legal ads for less than the present rate.

The election for a Carnegie library, involving a cost of 50 cents on every thousand dollars of assessed property, will be held the first Monday in April. The library will be worthily than to the rich man and his famore to the poor man and his famante for the common good.

The High Point Enterprise, which has been following false Gods, came back to the faith Thursday in an editorial that was a credit to Editor Biggs. The Enterprise was honest enough to see that the president was dead right and that the leaders of this country cannot be hoodooed.
