LETTER FROM GUNPOWDER

The dairy school, which was held at Sherrill's school house on Tuesday Feb. 27, was a decided success. The weather was all that could be desired, and a large crowd assembled to take part in the exercises. At 10 o'clock Mr. G. Mark Goforth, the county agent, opened the meeting with a few appropriate remarks and introduced M. Arey of the state department of agriculture who spoke at some length on the subject of dairying, showing both the direct and indirect benefits to be derived from it. He showed by actual figures that the selling of butter and milk removed less plant food from the soil than any other product. Mr. Arey is well posted and understands his business. He is an entertaining speaker. Next was a test of milk samples, with a Babcock tester by Mr. Furman, who is connected with the cheese factory in Yatauga county. His part on the program was very entertaining, practical and helpful. These gentlemen also gave a magic lantern show of some specimens of fine cattle, showing some of the world's record cows. They also showed some "scrub" cattle. At this juncture recess was taken and a sumptuous dinner spread, to which all were invited and partook to their satisfaction. After dinner Mr. G. Mark Goforth made an interesting speech and then introduced Mr. Adams, who happened to be present, representing the DeLaval cream separator people. He is a smooth speaker, and made a nice address. A few remarks were offered by some of the local brethren, then the meeting closed. We are decidedly of the opinion that the day could not have been better spent. The true community spirit was manifest in the large enthusiastic gathering. There has been a scourge of whooping cough and measles in this community, but the worst seems to be past. The hard freezing weather of the past few weeks has about destroyed the oat crop in this section. Wheat does not seem to be hurt much. The continuous rainy weather has not favored much behind with the plowing. Not much land has been plowed. The roads have been very bad. Even the sand-clay roads have given way in some places. Nothing could stand such weather except stone. March 5, 1917.

MONTHLY MEETING OF COMMISSIONERS HELD

Newton, March 6--The March meeting of the commissioners was unimportant by absence of anything more than routine business with the board, all members of which attended the meeting. The county attorney was instructed to bring suit against the authorities of Davidson and Gaston counties for the cost and transportation charges of prisoners sent to the roads of those counties, unless the claims cannot be collected otherwise. The costs and judgment in the bridge controversy at Hickory was ordered paid. The allowance of Henry Wallace was increased from \$1 to \$1.50 per month. Citizens relieved of poll tax were P. E. Herman of Clines, Rufus Sain of Bandys and other relieved of property tax were J. B. Propst of Jacobs Fork, \$6.52; A. E. Boyd of Caldwell, \$2.84; J. E. Pollard, Hickory, \$1.39; Q. E. Wilson of Caldwell, \$5.37. It was ordered that \$2,000 be paid Hickory township road commissioners. Salaries were paid for February. Received and ordered filed was the road petition for a road from Center church in Catawba township to Peach road near Mt. View church, hearing postponed till next meeting. CROP LIEN BILL

Following is a summary of the crop lien bill passed by the legislature, which was endorsed by the Farmers' Union, Governor Bickett and others: 1. That in the case of merchants or others selling supplies on crop lien or chattel mortgage security loans and also in the case of landlords advancing supplies to tenants) they shall in no case charge as "time prices" more than the standard cash price plus 10 per cent. (This means not an interest rate of 10 per cent but not more than 10 per cent added to the cash price in lieu of all interest or other charges for risk.) 2. In recognition of the risk involved persons, firms and corporations lending cash on crop lien security would also be allowed to add not exceeding 10 per cent on the amount advanced in lieu of all other commissions or interest charges, such money to be advanced in installments. 3. The credit unions may also charge 10 per cent commission on funds advanced on crop lien security, but the extra 4 per cent beyond the standard 6 per cent rate shall be regarded as an insurance fund to insure the credit union against losses, and any unusual portion of this insurance fund must be paid back as a dividend to the borrowers.
