### BIG MONEY BILLS PASSED IN HOUSE

Washington, April 5.—Four big appropriation bills which failed in the senate at the last session were re-passed in quick succession by the house, thus clearing the way for the war resolution which will be brought up today at 10 o'clock. The bills carried appropriations of more than \$440,000,000. They were: Army \$240,000,000; sundry civil, \$138,241,000; general deficiency, \$62,583,000; and military academy, \$1,349,000.

No changes were made in the form of any of the measures, as they passed the house at the last session. Numerous emergency amendments will be added to them in the senate and the final bills will be drafted in conference in the interest of speed. Many additional appropriation bills will have to be passed during the session, but the size or form of any of them will not be known until congress has declared a state of war existing and the executive branch of the government has submitted its plans for prosecuting hostilities. Tentative plans now being discussed are to pass a special deficiency bill similar to one carrying \$50,000,000 which was passed prior to the Spanish-American war to be used in any emergency which may arise in the various departments.

Before the vote on the sundry civil bill, Chairman Fitzgerald of the appropriation committee addressed the house on the need for rigid economy and efficient service in the coming crisis.

"I hope this nation will not be like the nations of Europe and for two or three years sleep unconscious of the necessity of rigid economy but that it will awake instantly to the necessity of developing the highest efficiency in government service," Representative Padgett, chairman of the naval committee, introduced a bill today to permit the president to take over boats, including small craft, in case of war.

### NEWTON NEGRO IS CHARGED WITH CRIMINAL ASSAULT

Newton, April 5.—Bart Shuford, a negro of middle age, will be given a preliminary hearing here Tuesday in county court, on charge of criminal assault on a 15-year-old negro girl in Jacobs Fork township. The girl had been sent to the spring by her mother for water and Shuford is alleged to have attacked her there. He immediately left and was trailing to a saw mill near Lowesville, Lincoln county, where Deputy Sheriff John O. Gilbert in company with Lincoln officers arrested him and brought him here where he was committed to jail without bond. The girl is reported as having been seriously injured.

### DRUNKENNESS DECLINES STEADILY IN ENGLAND

(By Associated Press.) London, April 5.—The number of convictions for drunkenness in Great Britain continues to decline. Returns for forty cities with population over 100,000, including greater London, shows the number of men convicted in 1916 was 53,000, as compared with 87,000 in the previous year; while the number of women convicted in 1916 was 24,000 against 36,000 in 1915.

Washington, April 5.—Requests for immediate appropriation of \$3,400,000,000 for the army and navy were made today by the executive departments.

Provision is made for increasing the enlisted strength of the navy to 150,000 men and to increase the marine corps to 30,000.

Of the great sum a little more than \$2,940,000,000 is asked for the army.

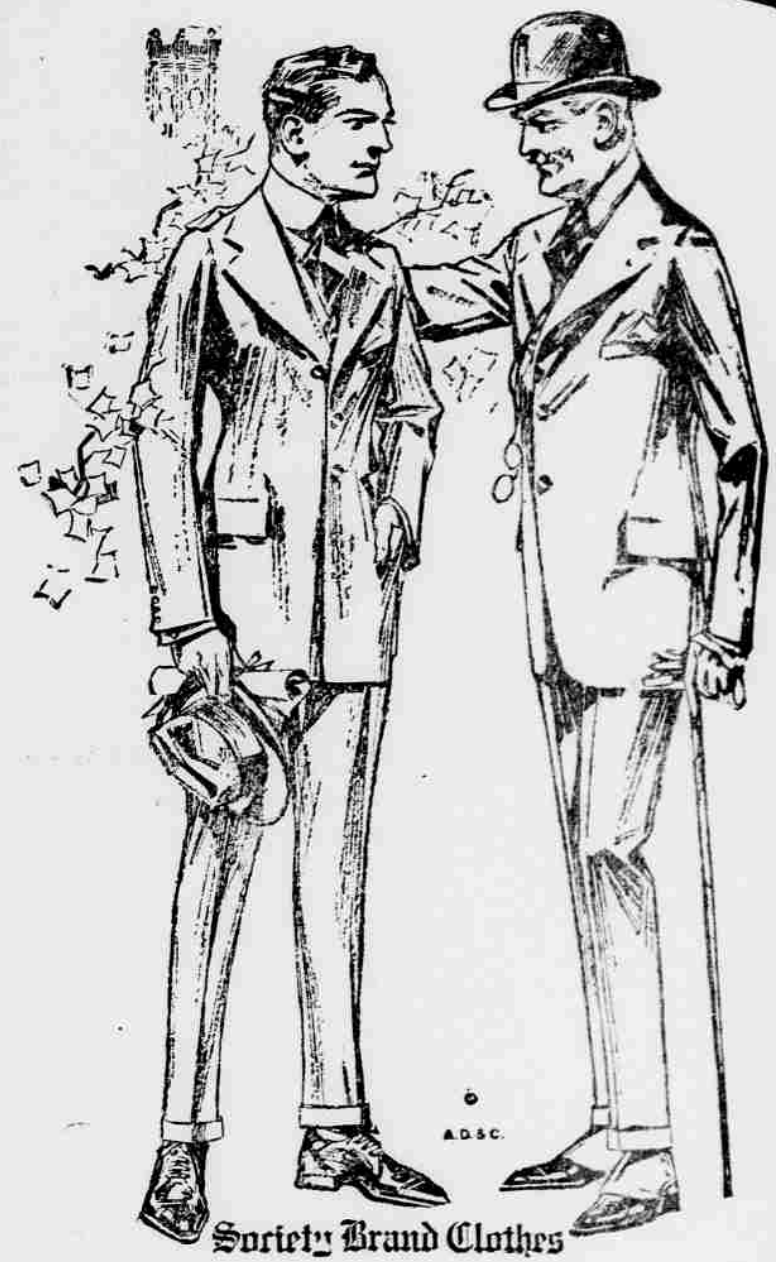
