While selection of the proper formula for the lenses and the relieving of optical defects is the primary consideration, yet particular attention is given to the style, size and shape suited to your features. Don't delay, a short time of neglect may cause permanent injury.

PROTECT SITTING HENS FROM MITES AND LICE

Washington, D. C., April 21.—Great care should be taken to keep nests occupied by sitting hens free from mites. The best way to work effectively against the mites, when many hens are involved, is in the form of a dust. The best remedy is a mixture of kerosene and sprays—form of dust recommended by specialists in the United States department of agriculture. It should be used freely about the house, and time may be spent in the present successful manner. If the mites are there, therefore, should be treated thoroughly before hens are set to start them in nests which are absolutely clean. Between the eggs of the nest a layer of lime and sulfur will tend to keep the mites away, and the eggs should be washed occasionally with kerosene. Broken eggs and the straw and other material should be removed promptly as they tend to attract mites.

Medicated egg nests, said to control poultry lice, are on the market. These consist largely of naphthalene. While this material will destroy lice when applied generally to the fowl, it is injurious to the hen's eggs as well as to the bird. If used in quantity, or if the medicated eggs are allowed to remain for some time beneath a hen, she may die as a result. Sodium fluoride powder, dusted on the fowl, or dissolved in water and used as a dip, is the best remedy for lice. Farmers' Bulletin 801, "Mites and Lice on Poultry," by F. S. Bishop and H. P. Wood, gives detailed directions for administering this treatment.

If you suspect that your variety of corn and cotton are not the best for your section, get in touch with your nearest experiment station, get the director's views, and then buy from a dealer or breeder of known reliability.

1. Save and apply to the land every possible pound of manure. Plant foods are too high-priced to be allowed to waste.
2. Give close study to your crop and soil needs, and then buy your commercial fertilizers to fit these.
3. Keep the harrows right behind the plows every day, in order that the clods may be pulverized before they get hard.
4. Clear out all foul fence rows, ditch banks and thickets. Such are eye-sores, take valuable land, and harbor harmful bugs.
5. Hold fast to your live-at-home resolutions, for foods and feeds are ruinously high for the farmer who has to buy them.—Progressive Farmer.


