WAGING THE WAR

North Carolinians, we feel quite sure, will feel no sting at being drawn into the United States army for the purpose of defeating a ruthless foe.

The conscription bill has passed and in a few days we will be familiar with its machinery. The government, we may be sure, will avoid the mistake made by England of drawing men from productive occupations and putting them into the army.

Thus far the country has met the responsibility of a serious world war in a manner that reflects honor on the people. All are Americans, as the Record felt sure would be the case once the people knew how serious the situation was for democracies, and there is a general desire that the war be brought to as speedy a close as possible.

While the young men are offering their services to the country, the least rest of us can do is to be ready to respond to any call that may be made upon us. Just now the need is for greater production, and this means in everything that is useful to the business life of the nation.

UNREST IN GERMANY

Indications are not lacking, if the Associated Press is correctly informed, that there will be monster peace demonstrations tomorrow in the central empires. The first of May has been observed in Europe for years as one vast holiday, the Socialists making the most of the occasion.

The world will wait impatiently for reports from Germany and Austria tomorrow. It may be days or weeks before the magnitude and extent of the disturbances seep through the rigid censorship imposed by the imperial government, but we will learn finally what happens. And it might not be a poor guess that the German people will issue an ultimatum of their own.

THE VALUE OF ONE

If an epidemic should stalk through this section, cutting down the babies and children, we should mobilize all the resources of the community in a contest against the disease as New York city did last fall. We would begin to measure the children in terms of dollars, and the sorrow of the community would be in proportion to the number of families affected.

And yet the death of any child is an economic loss to the community, a cause of intense sorrow in some home. A plague merely extends the losses and heartaches; that's the only difference.

Infant mortality is being reduced to a great extent, and it can be reduced still more. All we need is more intelligence, more understanding of the child.

IN HICKORY ON MAY 10

It was quite fitting that the committees of the Merchants Association and the Chamber of Commerce selected the night of May 10 to celebrate the turning on of the lights in Hickory's modern white way system. In the south May 10 is observed as Decoration Day and the exercises at night may well follow the more solemn exercises in the cemetery. As the Confederate soldier is as remarkable for the manner in which he set to work to rehabilitate his country as for the valor of his fighting qualities in the field of combat, so the celebration of the white way opening may well close a day given over more largely in later years in celebrating the triumph of the industrial and agricultural south as the valor of its men and the steadfastness of its women in war time.

The white way is one of the victories of peace. It is the consummation of a desire long cherished by Hickory people, who have had faith in their city, and whom faith will be translated into a splendor not surpassed by any city near its size in the south. Let us unite—town and country—in celebrating this mark of progress and enterprise on the part of Hickory. Let us make of the occasion a patriotic outpouring of the people. The time and occasion are worthy of our fullest cooperation.

BREAD IN THE HOME

Specialists Test Its Value and Best Way of Preparing It. Washington, D. C., April 30.—If home-baked bread was uniformly well made it would be used more extensively than at present in places of more expensive foods, says specialists in the United States department of agriculture. From the standpoint of nutrition it makes very little difference whether breadstuffs are served in the form of bread or in the form of breakfast cereals, side dishes with meat, or desserts. A man engaged in moderate muscular work can profitably consume about 3-4 of a pound a day of breadstuffs in one of these forms. This quantity is the equivalent of one pound of bread baked. As a matter of fact, however, it is not probable that in the average family this quantity is consumed and the deficiency is made up by the use of more expensive substances. Of course, bread, bread alone is not sufficient for the maintenance of health, but from both an economical and a hygienic point of view should be used more extensively than it usually is.

In a new publication of the department, Farmers' Bulletin 807, detailed directions for the making of bread in the home are given, together with a number of convenient receipts for home-made biscuits, rolls and bread in which rice or potatoes are used with flour. The bulletin also gives a score card by means of which it is suggested the housewife can estimate the merit of her product.

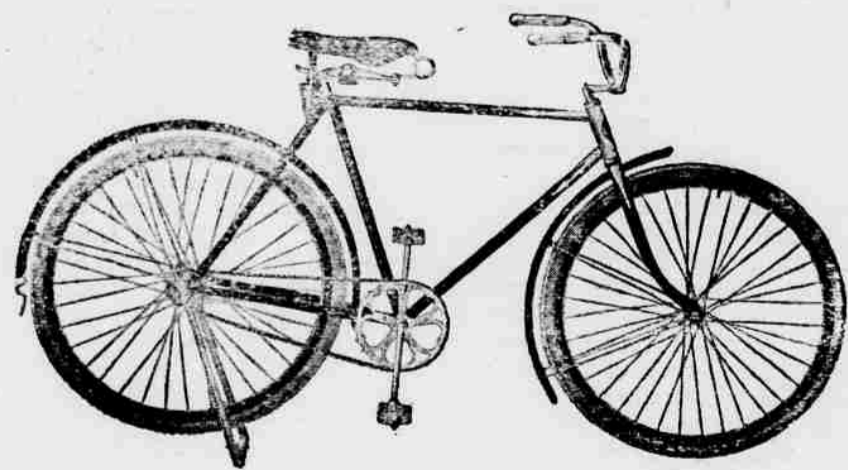
