RUSSIA OUT OF IT

There is not the slightest doubt that the United States entered the world war at a time when the fortunes of the allies, despite their remarkable successes on the French front, were at a low ebb.

Very few people are hopeful now that Russia will be able to prosecute a vigorous war. The financial exchanges long ago discounted further service from Russia and the ruble has fallen in value as a result of this conclusion.

The Record's only fear is that the United States entered too late to serve humanity and to make the world free for democracy except at a tremendous cost.

If Russia is not yet drenched in blood of civil war, the world will be surprised. The Record will bear witness that the members of the Woman's Club have worked unremittingly to make Baby Week a success.

THE STORY OF STORY In the fall of 1903 three young men from Watauga county entered the University of North Carolina—Romy Story, Jerry Day and Roby Day, the two latter brothers.

Roby Day was a born financier. All three boys earned their way through college, but Roby sold stereoscopes to the natives of West Virginia during the summer vacations and piled up a surplus that carried him over graduation with about \$300 to spare.

NO CENSORSHIP

The censorship section of the espionage bill has been killed by the house, but American newspapers will not abuse their privileges, the censorship, however distasteful it might appear, would have been included in the espionage bill.

The Associated Press, the Record has reason to believe, would not send out an item of military or naval movement that could result in the loss of a single American life; the Record, which is a member of this great institution, has omitted articles sent over the wire at the suggestion of the head office.

All of this goes to show that the newspapers have been under a voluntary censorship and that they will continue to be useful to the government. For our part, we did not object to the section of the bill, and were ready to let the officials in Washington outline those things that could be published.

The Record does not care to reproduce long articles, but it is compelled to do so at times in order to give its readers a better understanding of matters under discussion. The Springfield Republican is recognized as a well-balanced newspaper and generally is an authority on public questions, and lengthy articles from that paper appear frequently in the Record.

The German government raised its war funds by loans rather than by taxes on the assumption that France and Russia and England would have to pay the bill, just as France more than paid for the cost of the Prussian war in 1870.

WHAT SOUTHERN SPENT IN SOUTH IN MARCH Washington, May 5.—For every dollar paid to the Southern Railway Company by the people in the south during March, 1917, the Southern Railway Company paid out in the south \$1.07 according to figures announced today by Comptroller A. H. Plant.

For improvements to its roadway and structures, the Southern spent \$1,421,586.54 in March, 1917, as against \$952,191.21 during March, 1916; during the nine months ended March 31st, \$11,312,931.77 as against \$6,141,990.24 in 1916.

Results of operations, exclusive of interest, rentals and other income charges, were as follows: Gross revenue, March, 1917, \$7,106,864, an increase as compared with 1916, of \$736,847 or 11.57 per cent; operating expenses, taxes and uncollectible railway revenue, March, 1917, \$5,061,329, an increase as compared with 1916, of \$641,973 or 14.52 per cent.
