SENATE DISCUSSES BUDGET IN SECRET

 Washington, May 16.—When the senate today took up the great \$3,390,000,000 war budget it closed the doors and discussed it privately because many senators said it entailed many things in regard to defense that could not be discussed openly. The house passed the bill in open session.
 Senator Martin, Democratic leader, assented to considering the bill in executive session upon suggestion of Senator Weeks, Republican of Massachusetts. It was not decided whether the entire bill would be debated or only sections of it.
 Senator Weeks said the senate could not properly act on such a great bill without disclosing matters of a military nature.
 Secretary Baker of the war department had requested that the information he gave the committee be kept as confidential.

WAR TIME PROSPERITY PREDICTED BY ARMOUR

Chicago, May 16.—Continuation of the prosperity of the country in spite of the war, and continuation without experiencing any temporary depression will follow the adoption of a "business as usual" program in the opinion of J. Ogden Armour, Chicago meat packer and member of the Illinois state council of defense, and of the advisory committee of the council for national defense.
 "The prompt adoption by the American people of the 'business as usual' idea is going to enable this nation to prosecute war without experiencing a temporary depression such as England and France have recently recovered from," Mr. Armour said, discussing the economic situation of the country.

"Modern war," he said, "requires the expenditure of huge sums of money and means maximum employment and high wages for all workers. Other conditions peculiar to this war make it certain that this nation will enjoy a period of business and industrial activity the like of which has never before been seen and which is accrued whether the war lasts several months or several years."
 Speaking of the possibility that over-cautiousness might result from war economy suggestions, Mr. Armour said:
 "There is some reason to believe that economy rules will be misapplied for a while, but conditions are such that the public will soon see if they have not already, that there is no occasion whatever for them to become alarmed."
