WOMEN URGED TO PLAY

PART IN REGISTRATION

The 5th day of June, 1917, will be a momentous day in the history of the United States. In accordance with an act of congress and under direction of the president the flower of our youth will be called upon to register their names for military duty—in the great war for democracy now raging—as may be required of them. France, gallant, noble, wonderful France, is bleeding. She is calling to her sister republic across the seas in accents not to be misunderstood.

Secretary of War Baker, as chairman of the council of national defense, has sent to the different women committees of the council the following communication:

"As you know, the government earnestly desires that June 5, the day of registration shall be made a magnificent demonstration of the unity of this country. In the great festivals with which the authorities of each state are preparing to celebrate registration day, women should be fully represented. They are giving those they hold dearest. Let them show by their active cooperation in this great national undertaking that they give gladly because in full appreciation of the nobility of the cause.

The council of national defense has already asked the state councils of defense to aid in making registration day a great and memorable occasion in our country's history. It is asking the state councils to include women in all preparations. Through your committee I appeal to the women of the country everywhere to join in the celebration of this historic day.

The steering wheel struck the young man across the stomach and he died while being brought to Graham. The accident occurred on the road between Saxapahaw and Graham, near Maxwell's chapel. There was five occupants of the car and two others, Jessie Merritt and Jim Burgess, both of Chapel Hill, were seriously injured.

TO MAKE REGISTRATION

DAY LIBERTY BOND DAY

Raleigh, June 4.—Governor Bickett yesterday afternoon issued an appeal to the bankers of North Carolina calling upon them to make registration day, June 5 a bank holiday on which a concerted effort will be made to induce the people to buy liberty bonds. The governor calls upon men of finance to see to it that the state dedicates its money power as well as man power. The governor's appeal follows:

"The bankers of North Carolina are patriotic. In times passed they have heroically come to the rescue and saved the credit of the state. An unparalleled opportunity for public service now confronts them. They have already demonstrated their willingness to use this opportunity and are affording the people every reasonable facility for buying liberty bonds. In order to release their energies and give them time for further service, I urge them to make Tuesday, June 5, a banking holiday. On this day let there be a concerted effort on the part of all bank officials in North Carolina to induce the people to invest in liberty bonds. Let there be a dedication of the money power as well as the man power of the state on this great day."

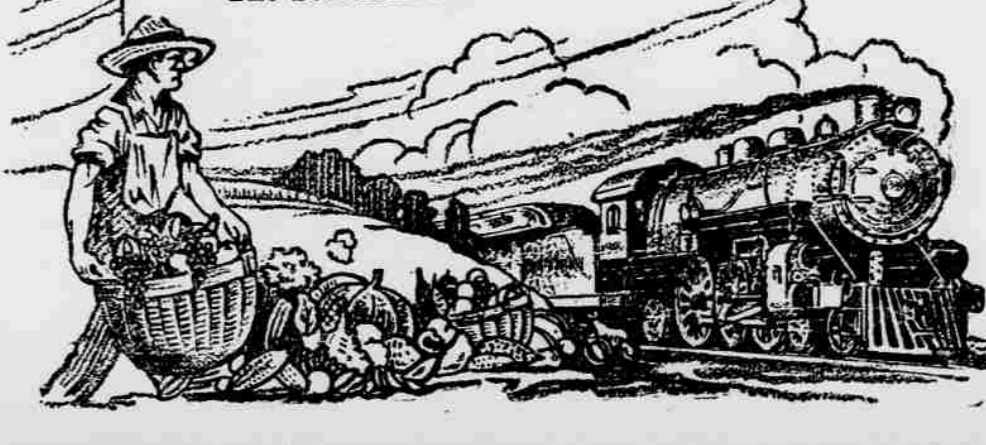
