NEGRO SENTENCED TO PAY DEATH PENALTY

Mobile, Ala., June 30.—Fisher Brooks, negro taxicab driver, was last night convicted of the murder of Mrs. Julia May Hess, the jury fixing the penalty at hanging. Albert Sanders, another negro under indictment for complicity in the murder, will be tried without delay, it was understood by the authorities.

The body of Mrs. Hess, who had come to Mobile from Fulton, Ala., on her way to Florida, was discovered May 24 in a creek near here. The throat had been cut.

Sanders, one of the negroes implicated, drove Mrs. Hess from the Southern Railway station to a local hotel on her arrival the morning of May 30. The next morning she called for a taxicab to convey her to the Louisville and Nashville station, and Brooks responded. The prosecution built its case on the theory that Brooks killed Mrs. Hess with robbery as the motive, and cast the body into the creek.

FRENCH CAVALRY HORSES DYING LARGE NUMBERS

Toulouse, France, June 30.—Cavalry horses have been dying in large numbers from a mysterious disease in different regions of the south of France. The mortality has reached 60 per cent to 70 per cent of new contingents arriving at Toulouse, Albi, Bordeaux, Narbonne and Perpignan. Horses apparently sound and well when they are unloaded from the cars die so soon after being stabled that it is impossible to treat them. This situation dates from 1914, soon after the declaration of war. The mortality was greatest in the spring of 1915 and it is still alarming.

Horse dealers and veterinaries of Toulouse have been unable to account for this strange epidemic. Some veterinaries assume that it is an infectious influenza; others suspect that a subtle means of slow poisoning is practiced on the animals while en route from the farm to the cavalry depots.
