FRENCH CAVALRY HORSES DYING LARGE NUMBERS

Toulouse, France, June 30 .- Cavalry horses have been dying in large numbers from a mysterious disease in different regions of the south of France. The mortality has reached 60 per cent to 70 per cent of new contingents arriving at Toulouse, Albi, Bordeaux, Narbonne and Perpignan. Horses apparently sound and well when they are unloaded from the cars lie so soon after being stabled that t is impossible to treat them. This situation dates from 1914, soon after the declaration of war. The mortality was greatest in the spring of 1915 and it is still alarming.

Horse dealers and veterinaries of Toulouse have been unable to account for this strange epidemic. Some veterinaries assume that it is an infectious influenza; others suspect that a subtle means of slow poisoning is practiced on the animals while en route from the farm to the cavalry depots.




