WILL NEED FOOD

Col. W. J. Shuford made a good point in an interview with the Record Friday. This section will be called upon to help feed the national troops in camp at Charlotte, Columbia, Spartanburg and Greenville and all those who have had any dealings with the government will bear out the statement that Uncle Sam is not niggardly when it comes to spending money, though he has to cut through a great deal of red tape.

Judge Albert L. Cox, son of Gen. William R. Cox, Confederate soldier and splendid Tar Heel, continues to play in luck, but it is deserved. Judge Cox was captain of the Raleigh company when the troops were ordered to the border, and resigned his commission to accept an appointment at the superior court bench. Now he is made colonel of the artillery regiment to be organized in the state. Colonel Cox is an old football player, having been a good end on the university team along about 1900-03.

The North Carolina national guard will be trained at the Greenville, S. C., camp, the war office announces, while the national guard of Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island and Vermont will go to the Charlotte camp. We had hoped that our boys would be kept in the state, but the sending of the troops from one section to another—which is not the case with North Carolina, however—will serve a good turn in demonstrating that all are Americans and all are more or less alike.

Springfield, Mass., citizens are urging the erection of a bridge between that city and West Springfield that will be 75 feet wide, instead of 60 feet, as recommended by a bridge commission. The cost of the 60 foot structure is estimated at \$2,250,000, Catawba citizens will be interested to learn, and the wider bridge would run the cost up to something over \$3,020,000. If anybody is disposed to kick over the cost of the bridges across the Catawba, he might take comfort from the Springfield affair.

One almost is ready to sympathize with those Industrial Workers of the World, lawless men as they are, in the plight in which they find themselves in New Mexico. If they had any regard for the law or the rights of others, they would command an amount of sympathy that would aid them in their hard luck.

The mere fact that liberty loan bonds were quoted on the New York stock exchange for less than par should not cause any holder of this paper to worry. Speculators might be able to drive the certificates several dollars below par, but they will be worth 100 cents on the dollar regardless, and the chances are that they will be worth more. Hold on to your liberty bonds.

Various authorities are pointing out the profits to be made in raising sheep, but nowhere are the advantages more favorable than in the rugged country to the north and west of Hickory. The great mountain section is suited to the sheep raising industry, but dogs and other causes have tended to prevent a wealth of money from flowing to our farmers.

The Catawba County News avers that it heard that one man in Hickory was after the postoffice job entirely too soon, but the point we made was there was no "scramble" for the position. There's a deal of difference between that and a "scramble," if we know the meaning of the word.

Don't forget to preserve copies of the Record containing the names of the men registered on June 5. They will come in handy all summer for reference.

The demand for an audit of the books of the county board of education, made recently by County Commissioner Stroup, will be complied with, of course, if there is any law for it. While politics probably is behind the call, still it is good public business to have official accounts audited frequently, and it is much better for those in office.
