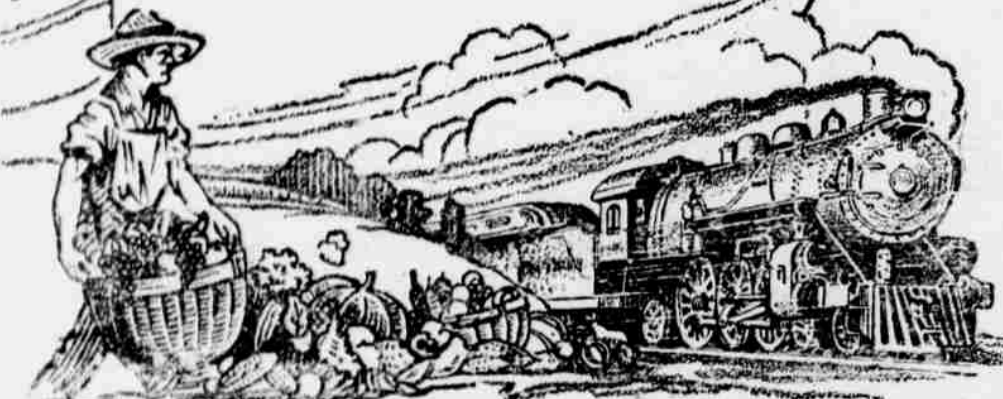

It is hoped his district will honor itself, the state, the judiciary, and the great Judge above, by renominating and electing Judge Frank Carter to succeed himself to his present calling for which he is so pre-eminently fitted.

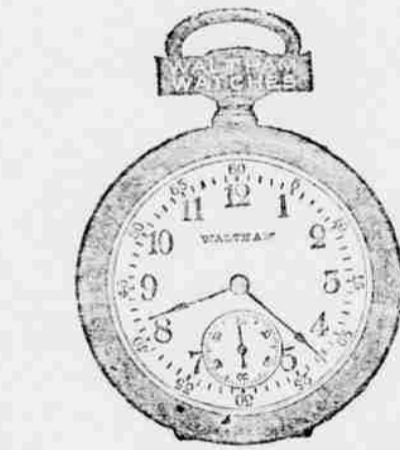
