THE WAR REVENUE BILL

Senator Simmons last week explained the war revenue bill as revised by the senate finance committee and defended it from attacks made by Representative Kitchin of the house ways and means committee. The senate bill has more opponents in North Carolina than the house measure, because it takes more taxes from excess profits. Chairman Kitchin declared that his own measure was crude and that he would swallow it with his eyes shut.

The chief objection to the Simmons revised bill seems to be that it does not fall heavy enough on big incomes, but the chairman explains that a certain amount of money must go back into trade and that all the governments at war with the exception of Canada and Spain which latter is not at war—have worked the revenue problem out on the same principle. The government will have to collect heavily from moneyed interests, but most fair commentators agree that it will be wise to raise the schedules on incomes from year to year until these incomes are practically confiscated.

We know so little about finances that it is difficult for us to discuss the question intelligently. Our idea is that the taxes should be so distributed as to bear as fairly on all alike as far as possible with the least disarrangement of business. In other words the taxes should not make useful business enterprises lose money. But that is a big question. Wealth should be made to pay its just proportion.

The fight will come over the surtaxes on individual incomes. Chairman Kitchin, with his usual vindictiveness, assailed the Simmons measure, and attacked all those who favor it. The News and Observer, whose editorial a week ago non-combated take offense at, drew from Mr. Kitchin much wrath, but the Raleigh paper scored heavily when it quoted Mr. Kitchin's own words against the merits of his own bill. Chairman Simmons of course will stand for amending any objectionable features of the revised measure, and it is probable that the levy on individual incomes, which seems to be the most indefensible part of the measure, will be made larger. Otherwise, the senate bill seems to be a much better measure than that produced by the house committee. The Record long has realized that the cost of this war will have to be met and even little business enterprises like it will feel the strain, but it is asking nothing for itself and only just treatment for all other interests.

THE ANTI-DRAFTERS

Those things for which the anti-drafters in Jacobs Fork township claimed to be contending most vigorously at Pleasant Garden, other North Carolinians will fight for. The anti-drafters claim to desire freedom, but their manner of obtaining it is different from that of other people. They would aid the enemy, would paralyze the United States and break down government in true Tom Watson style.

No doubt the majority of the men attending the meeting Saturday night were condemning President Wilson and congress a year ago for not entering the war and eating Germany alive; their actions now would lead to that belief.

They are absolutely powerless however, to do any great harm. The people of the United States are blessed with common sense and this faculty will make them all the more determined to secure independence, even for the men who would do everything to block them.

It may be necessary for the government to take action in the Jacobs Fork case, it even may be necessary to put the more boisterous gentlemen under bond until they sober up, but there is no cause for alarm. They make the rest of the country more determined to do right.

The various exemption boards have more worries than any other set of men in the country. Theirs is a thankless task.

Braxton of the Kinston Free Press admits the disposition to allow the war garden to make in the sun. He has more reason than most of us. He is in a few hours ride of the best fishing grounds in the United States, he can hit the surf two or three times a week, and watch the pretty girls to boot. To be truthful about it, our war garden is twice as good now as it was two months ago—but it never was anything to brag about.
