SCRAPPING THE SEA SLUGS

There is nothing very surprising or revolutionary in the decision of the navy department to abandon its original program of building a great fleet of small submarine chasers. It does not mean that the small boats have no value, on the contrary it is reported that some of the allies would be glad to have more of them than they can get, and are sorry that other demands on manufacturing facilities have led the United States to give up building more of the "sea slugs" and other small craft.

France in particular has made much use of small launches for patrol work and perhaps they work better in the Mediterranean than in the north Atlantic where except in fair weather they are not very satisfactory. France has a long coastline with commerce divided among many ports, and it has made rather a feature of multiplying patrols and co-ordinating their reports by the aid of wireless and hydroplanes. For this work the small submarine chasers would be valuable precisely because they are small and cheap and can be operated by a small crew; their function would be less to destroy U-boats than to keep watch for them.

It is generally admitted that the war on submarines has accomplished less than had been hoped for and the frank speech of Admiral Jellicoe upon this point is a sufficient warrant for the discarding by our navy department of its plans for increasing the fleet of small craft. Vice-Admiral Sims, in charge of the American destroyer squadron on the other side, has had a first rate chance to study the problem, and while he has not been quoted on the subject, it is safe to assume that the decision would not have been taken without his advice.

The abandonment of this part of the program, however, does not mean the slightest cessation of the war on the U-boats. On the contrary the most efficient chaser is the destroyer, which got its name from being built to wage war on torpedoes, but which is equally well adapted to the newest phase of naval warfare. Naval men will no doubt welcome the decision for most of them have been dubious as to the merits of small hastily built chasers, while the destroyer is one of the most useful types of naval craft, and as valuable for service with a fleet as in patrolling the seas for submarines. A navy can hardly have too many of these, and our own navy was somewhat short of them even before the war on submarines began. Sometimes intrinsic value has to give way to special temporary needs, but in view of the meager results of the offensive against the U-boats it seems a sound policy to concentrate construction upon a type which is not only the best adapted to the work in hand, but also of permanent utility to the navy.

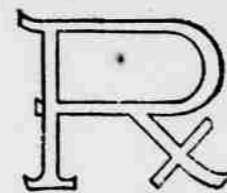
