WAR AND THE PEOPLE

The wars of the French revolution were caused by the efforts of Austria, Prussia and England and French Tories to make the French people accept a king instead of a government that they thought they wanted. Napoleon, contrary to common belief, did not fire the French spirit when he stood at the head of a street and fed the Paris mob on grape and caustic; the fighting spirit had been bred in the French as a result of those wars which the nations of Europe, all with reactionary governments at that time, had forced on republican France. And after the Napoleonic wars were over, and after a Louis had been restored to the throne, the French people rather promptly proceeded to attend to their own affairs.

The French people chose to make their government a democracy, but they did not succeed in establishing it finally until Napoleon the Little, tricked into the war with Prussia in 1870 by Bismarck, had been compelled to relinquish his throne. Even as late as 1870 there might have been opposition to democracies in Europe if Bismarck had not believed that republics could not take care of themselves. He had a contempt for democracy, and we was willing for all nations except Germany to become democracies.

But the plutocrats and divine righters have been proven wrong. Republics can fight and do fight. The people, however, had much rather live quietly and in the pursuit of their ordinary business. They have no ambitious dreams to gratify, no enemies to punish, no lands to conquer. Most of them do not even want to fight unless their land is invaded. That was the case with the French, the English people did not awake to their danger for over a year, and all the American people, with three years of war, are not united on winning it or making Germany grant such terms as would make the world safe for them in future.

These facts are recalled by the efforts of Pope Benedict to restore peace. We are hoping he will succeed, but we are doubtful. As much as the nations lined up against the Prussian military machine might desire to quit, they might not be able to do it. They cannot stop and allow Germany time to consolidate her gains in Europe and await a more favorable time for striking at their throat again. That kind of peace would be a nightmare and would be almost as bad as war. The peace that comes must be one that will permit the democratic nations to live without fear of having their liberties denied them.

OPEN DOORS FOR MORE HEALTH WORK IN STATE

Although lack of interest on the part of the counties in the state would indicate that the life extension work already conducted in two counties in the state—Vance and Alamance—with splendid results will have to be discontinued, the state board of health is making a sweeping offer of cooperation for the health unit not only among counties but among large industrial concerns employing a great many persons. The three months examination is complete and makes it possible for every person in the county, who comes between the age limits prescribed and who desire it, to have a minute searching physical examination. The age limit is advanced in order that the degenerative diseases may be spotted and checked. In no sense, is the state board of health thus usurping the function of the private physician practicing in the county. The board attempts no cure and prescribes no treatment. Its work stops with the diagnosis, in this particular line of health activity. As a fact, the examinations come as a distinct help to the physicians and the specialists in the counties as well as to the people. Those persons in whom defects or diseases which should be treated by physicians are found are advised to consult specialists. In no case does the board or its physician recommend any particular physician or any particular specialist. It is a tribute to all concerned that in neither of the pieces of this kind of health work thus far undertaken has there been any friction between the county physicians and specialists and the representatives of the board.
