### THE LAFOLLETTE RESOLUTION

Senator LaFollette's peace resolution is impossible. It proposes something affecting Belgium that is morally repulsive and monstrous. Even the peace resolution of the American union against militarism, one of the most conspicuous pacifist organizations in the United States, insists "that independent Belgium will be entitled to special restitution from Germany, owing to the circumstances under which she was forced into the war." Is it possible that a considerable number of people anywhere in this country would approve of Senator LaFollette's resolution of the principle of "special restitution" in the case of Belgium and support his proposal of a "common fund," to be provided by all the belligerent nations, which should be used for the "restoration" of the "portions of territory in any of the countries most seriously devastated by the war?" The theory of this LaFollette proposal is that Germany is no more to blame, morally speaking or legally speaking, than any or all of her antagonists in this war—no more to blame even than the United States. All the belligerents should contribute to the "common fund" without the least distinction between them being made on the ground of responsibility for the crime of Belgium's violation and despoilment. If one could be sure that the Wisconsin senator saw clearly the bearing of his proposal it might well be branded as a piece of stark infamy. It has so happened that Lieut.-Gen. Baron von Freytag-Loringhoven, chief of the supplementary general staff of the German army, otherwise described as Germany's "leading military historian," who has access to the general staff records, has written an article within a few days for the German press in which he admits that Germany's invasion of neutral Belgium in August, 1914, was not due in the least to military and defensive necessity provoked by alleged preparations of the French to use Belgium as a highway for the invasion of Germany. The violation of Belgium, which this German military historian now says was not anticipated by the French, whose preparations were horribly confined to their own German frontier, is seen more and more clearly with each passing year to have been one of the vilest acts of treachery and one of the most sinister and brazen crimes against civilization that the history of mankind records. Yet the senator from Wisconsin would have Germany go scot free in the assessment of special damages on account of that named, tortured and ruined country. He would have no special restitution made by Germany to Belgium; we should all—France, Britain and even the United States—be placed on a level with Germany in contributing to a common fund. The Wisconsin senator has many admirable qualities of mind and heart and he has performed much good service for the country, but his proposal is staggering because it virtually denies that for the most infamous acts deliberately committed for a selfish end a nation can be held accountable. Before the United States recognizes the principle of equality with Germany in moral obligation to restore Belgium, the republic should challenge the most terrible fate that an invincible German militarism could devise for it.
