

> Gastonia, Aug. 28.— There is no busier place in Gastonia than at the Fair. The 1916 fair was housed in tents, with the exception of the cattle, pigs and horses which had splendid equipment. On account of the tent people being unable to secure army duck because of the demand in equipping the troops, the fair which will be held Octobel 9 to 13, 1917, was face to face with either not holding a fair, or going to the tremendous cost of building permanent buildings.

It was quickly decided to erect three new buildings, one 60 ft. wide by 250 ft. long that would hold the field crops, fancy work, cooking and canning, merchantile exhibits, manufacturers display, community fair exibits, and miscellaneous exhibits, another building 60 ft wide by 250 ft. ong will house the school exhibits of Gaston, Lincoln and Cleveland counties as well as the corn club, canning club and home demonstration lub exhibits of aston, Cleveland and incoln counties, also, in this buildng will be the free public rest room Walter S. 




