PEACE IN 1918

Frank H. Simonds, regarded as the foremost military critic in the country, believes that the war will come to an end in 1918. He is of the opinion that Berlin will strive all winter to secure peace by negotiation, hoping thereby to avoid battles in the spring that will spell disaster to German hopes of conquest.

Even the Russian collapse has not saved the Germans. They have taken thousands of men and many big guns from the eastern theatre, but still have been unequal to the superior number and equipment of the allies in the west.

Record readers will recall that this paper has ventured the opinion that the war will be over by spring, provided the allies continue their preparations. We are almost confident the German government, which is not deceived as to the power of its enemies, will be willing to make almost any sort of peace rather than face the consequences of an offensive by the combined armies of the allies in the west, together with a major operation by the rejuvenated Russians.

Those western pacifists and pro-Germans who are having trouble in securing a hall for their meeting will receive better consideration in Washington. As a matter of justice they should be permitted to assemble and discuss anything, though the wisdom of anti-American talk is questionable, and we hope they won't check more than four tons of bricks.

Hickory friends of Dr. Simon Peter Long, the eminent Lutheran divine, will be glad to welcome him here September 25 when he comes to help Lenoir College celebrate the closing of the endowment campaign and the quadricentennial of the Protestant Reformation. The occasion will be notable all around.

German official statements apprise the German people of "insignificant gains" by the allies at one point and deny gains where the allies did not attack. The Berlin reports, however indicate that the crown prince or Prince Rupprecht or some other prince made a grand defense where the blow did not fall.

The Statesville Landmark will be a complete record of the statistics of the exemption board in the western district. Fifty years from now, one Judge Clark retires from harness, files of his good paper will be sought by county historians. The Landmark is doing real service to the state.

Although pacifists and pro-Germans contend that the majority of people are with them, we notice that they are mighty glad to have police protection when they start any disloyal activities in northern and western cities. Men usually attend these meetings and trouble begins for the agitators.

Newton and Hickory people will have an unusual privilege Sunday of hearing the state's spokesman. Those who fail to hear Governor Bickett will have much to regret.

The Russians are in a rather bad way, it must be confessed, and yet it is possible for them to be in a worse fix.

The Record would be glad to help its Newton friends in any way possible, but a town that can turn out over 300 people at a mass meeting, does not need much scolding. They will get the depot.

The Washington government which is fighting autocracy abroad, is also dealing out a few blows to those agents who have endeavored to coin money at the expense of the democracy at home.

Herr Hardwick's bill prohibiting the sending of drafted men to France received no consideration from the Americans on the senate military affairs committee.

Judge Boyd has held the federal child labor law unconstitutional, but the odds are 20 to 1 that he will be overruled by the United States supreme court, before which the appeal from his decision will be taken.

The Newton Enterprise says that nine young men who have been trained in its office are serving their country and none of them has offered an objection to being sent to France.

We are constrained to observe that a good many men of military age would not be adverse to serving the government in an advisory capacity.

SEVERAL ARE INJURED IN AN AUTO ACCIDENT

Friday. Vance Miller of Chino Grove, who was driving the machine, also sustained a fractured collar bone.

Just before reaching Concord they met a Ford driven by a negro. As the cars approached each other the negro drove his car to the left and in front of the Grant machine it is said. The latter was forced to turn sharply to the left to avoid a collision and the sudden strain caused one of the rear wheels of the Grant car to give away. The machine turned over, throwing the occupants out. The other three occupants of the car suffered only slightly from minor cuts and bruises.
