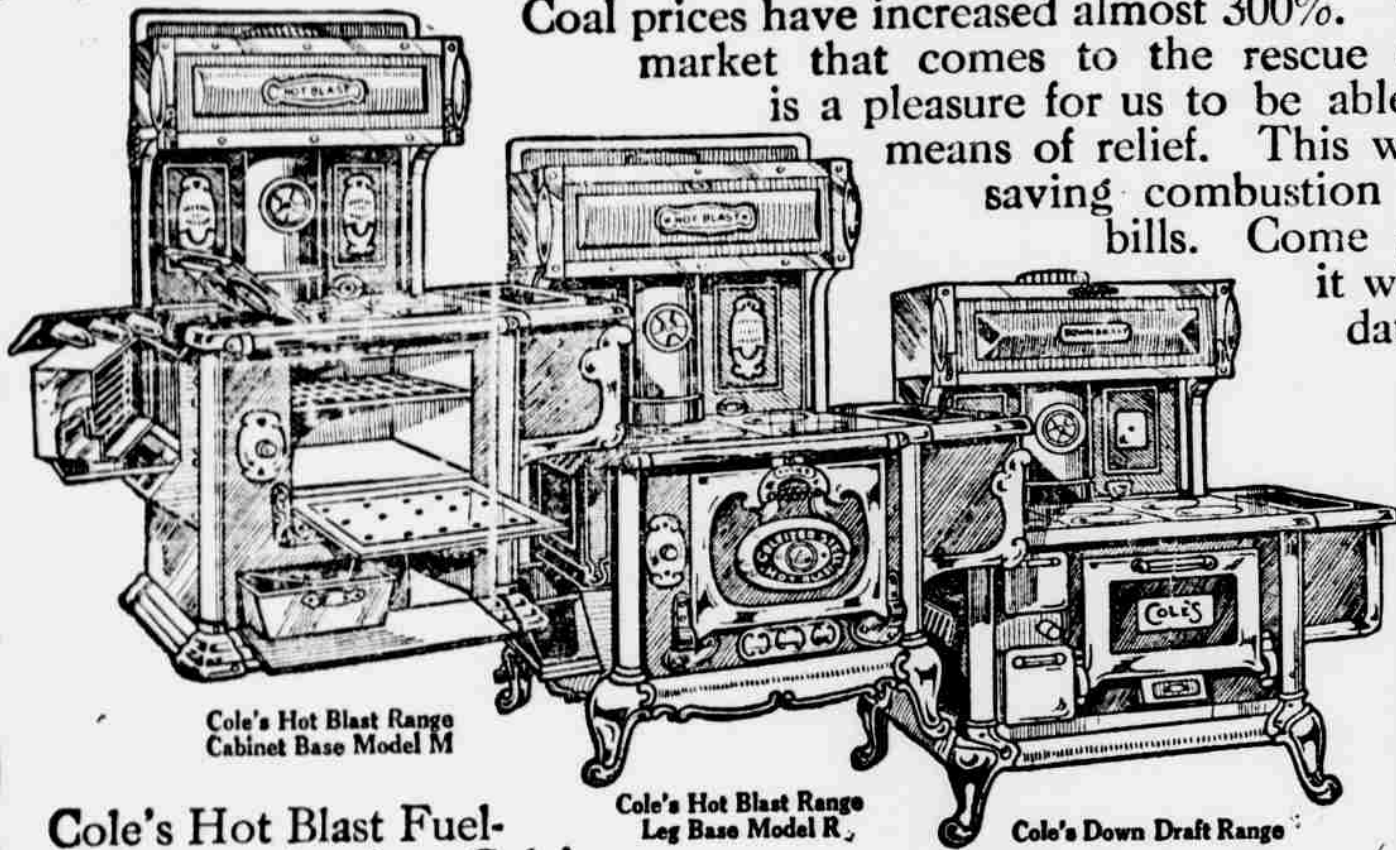

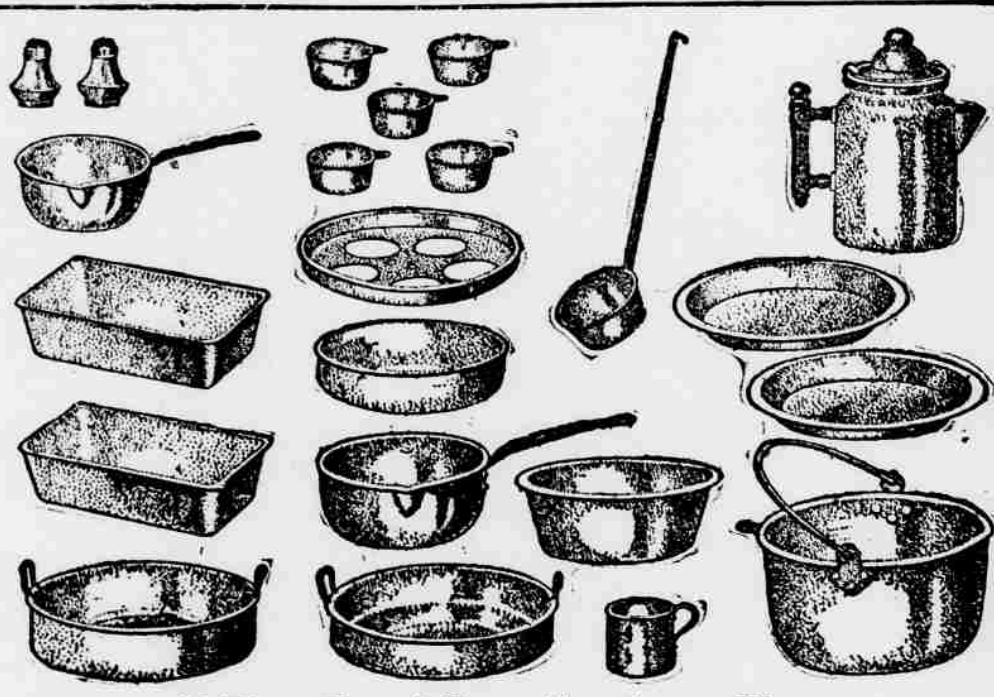

Fritz, president of Lenoir College, announces a big celebration on the campus on Tuesday, September 25, with Dr. Simon Peter Long of Mansfield, Ohio as the speaker of the day, to commemorate the closing of the Lenoir College endowment campaign—the quadricentennial anniversary of the Protestant Reformation.

Dr. Long will speak at the college Tuesday morning and afternoon, September 25, and at Holy Trinity Lutheran church Tuesday and Wednesday evening. The coming of Dr. Long will be hailed with delight by all who have heard him on former visits to Hickory.

A basket picnic will be served on the campus Tuesday. It is hoped this will be more than a repetition of the great dedication picnic of 1913 when a table 240 feet long was well-laden with choice rations and a great crowd was fed.

GENERAL HOYLE IS WELL KNOWN HERE

Brig. Gen. Eli B. Hoyle, U. S. A., who has been called from retirement to take command of the department of the east, is a second cousin of Mrs. E. L. Shuford of Hickory, with whom the General and Mrs. Hoyle visited last year. General Hoyle was reared by Mrs. E. L. Shuford's father—the late E. L. Shuford—on his plantation in Alabama. Mr. Shuford was a great uncle of General Hoyle and adopted and reared him after the death of his parents.

The Charlotte Observer's Daily Reminder column contains the following on General Hoyle: "Brigadier General Hoyle, U. S. A., who has been called from retirement

of the east, has often been pointed to as an ideal American soldier. He was born at Canton, Ga., sixty-six years ago and in his sixty-fourth year was retired for age. He graduated from West Point in 1875 and from the artillery school in 1880. In the war with Spain he served as chief ordnance officer of volunteers. Later he saw active service in the Philippines. Gen. Hoyle married the daughter of a United States army officer, the late Gen. R. E. DeRussy. He has a son and four sons-in-law who are captains in the army and his brother-in-law is Gen. Arthur Murray, who has just been given command of the western department."
